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GENERAL OVERVIEW

Executive Summary

During its open application period for SLFRF funds, the County of Chester, Pennsylvania (County) reviewed 309 projects, totaling over \$300 million in requests, submitted by County departments, municipalities, small businesses, nonprofit organizations, and other entities. These applications resulted in the awarding of over 100 projects totaling more than \$67 million. Additional County projects were also approved. The full allocation has been obligated in accordance with US Treasury's regulations.

To best respond to the effects of the pandemic and promote equitable economic recovery, the County has obligated approximate funding to the following areas:

- Government Services: \$56 million
- Mental Health Services: \$15 million
- Public Health and Safety Services: \$12.9 million
- Housing Services/Affordable Housing: \$7.5 million
- Infrastructure: \$2.8 million
- Community Services: \$2.2 million
- Skills Training: \$2 million
- Food Programs: \$1.8 million
- Library Services: \$441,000
- Childcare: \$250,000

The County's intent with these obligations is to provide support to the community to address challenges that were either exacerbated or uncovered by the effects of COVID-19.

Uses of Funds

The use of ARPA funds may potentially relate to the following areas:

- a. Public Health (EC 1)
- b. Negative Economic Impacts (EC 2)
- c. Public Health-Negative Economic Impact: Public Sector Capacity (EC 3)
- d. Premium Pay (EC 4)
- e. Water, Sewer, and Broadband Infrastructure (EC 5)
- f. Revenue Replacement (EC 6)

It was important to the County to allocate and distribute its nearly \$102 million in funds in a way that best serves the community and adheres to the spirit of the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). Priority Based Budgeting (PBB), and Budgeting for Outcomes (BFO) are unique and innovative approaches being used by local governments to match available resources with community priorities. They also serve to provide valuable decision-making information to elected officials, engage citizens in the budgeting process, and escape the traditional routine of basing "new" budgets on revisions to the "old" budget. These approaches help ensure that the community can identify and preserve those programs and services that are most highly valued. Processes like PBB and BFO were used to determine the intended and actual uses of SLFRF funding to best serve the communities within the County of Chester.

Susquehanna Accounting and Consulting Services, Inc. is assisting the County with compliance. A summary of all proposals received– regardless of whether they were funded or not – is posted on the County’s ARPA webpage.

The County’s two overarching goals for this program are to (1) ensure geographic equity in the disbursement of funds and (2) engage the community in the evaluation process to ensure that SLFRF funds are used for programs and services that are most highly valued.

Promoting equitable outcomes

In Executive Order 13985, President Biden defined “equity” as, “the consistent and systemic fair, just, and impartial treatment of all individuals, including individuals who belong to underserved communities that have been denied such treatment.” With this definition in mind, the County recognizes that any action taken that does not address inequity will perpetuate it.

The County intended to address inequity as follows:

- a. Goals: The County had four main goals for addressing historically underserved, marginalized, and otherwise negatively affected groups.
 1. In addition to making efforts to ensure geographic diversity in the use of SLFRF funds, the County recognized two distinct geographical areas – the City of Coatesville (a Qualified Census Tract) and Southern Chester County – as communities where deliberate action to address inequity must be taken. The County’s goal was to use SLFRF funds to support local initiatives within these communities.
 2. The County recognized individuals experiencing homelessness and housing insecurity as historically underserved and marginalized communities. For this reason, the County obligated a portion of SLFRF funds towards the construction of affordable housing, housing counseling programs, eviction prevention services, emergency shelters, and other housing-specific services.
 3. For historically underserved or marginalized communities, access to healthcare is often a challenge. In Chester County specifically, the recent closures of two hospitals created a healthcare desert. Long ambulance rides and overcrowding of the County’s three remaining hospitals have further increased the barriers to quality healthcare, particularly for the most marginalized communities. The County aimed to address this local public health crisis with SLFRF funds to increase access to care, improve EMS service capabilities, and support the introduction of emerging methods for community care.
 4. Many negatively affected groups rely on community-based nonprofit organizations for services including specialized counseling, job skills training, emergency resource access, and more. In support of the County’s robust nonprofit community, a portion of SLFRF funds have been obligated to these initiatives.
- b. Awareness: The County announced and promoted the open application period through press releases and postings on the County’s website, as well as social media

accounts. Representatives of the County also attended meetings within the community to promote and discuss the application process. When finalized, awards were announced through press releases to ensure that the community is aware of the services available as a result of SLFRF funds. The County also encouraged all recipients to actively promote the services they provide which were made possible with SLFRF funds.

- c. Access and Distribution: The County ensured equal access to the application period through the program manager, who was available via email, phone, and video conferencing to address individual questions and assist applicants with their proposals. With respect to services provided by recipients, the County included a nondiscrimination clause in the grant funding agreement all recipients are required to sign.
- d. Outcomes: The most prominent way the County used SLFRF funds to close gaps in service is through supporting, rebuilding, and stabilizing human service programs provided by independent organizations and the County. Human service programs historically provide support to those individuals, families, and households that need the most assistance. By supporting Chester County's human services industry, SLFRF funds support those historically disinvested in communities. Where relevant, the County is monitoring project outcomes by race, ethnicity, gender, and other relevant factors.

In response to its goals for addressing inequity, the County obligated the following:

- 1. Approximately \$6.8 million towards initiatives in West Nottingham Township, East Nottingham Township, Elk Township, New London Township, Franklin Township, London Britain Township, and Oxford Borough – which make up Southern Chester County – and the City of Coatesville.
- 2. Approximately \$7.5 million towards services for individuals experiencing homelessness and housing insecurity, including over \$2 million for the development of affordable housing units.
- 3. Approximately \$24.6 million towards public and mental health services. This includes improvements to EMS facilities and equipment, construction of an emergency services center in Southern Chester County, and investment in new and alternative initiatives to provide healthcare, as well as support for organizations providing mental health support to underserved communities.
- 4. Over 65% of the 100+ projects that were awarded Chester County SLFRF funds support local, community-based nonprofit organizations – many of which provide services directly to historically underserved, marginalized, and otherwise negatively affected groups.

Community Engagement

To ensure community engagement, the County assembled an Evaluation Committee, made up of members of the community and County personnel, to review proposed projects for suitability and make recommendations for the best use of funds. The Committee was split into six teams, in accordance with Treasury's six expenditure categories. Each team evaluated applications

pertaining to their respective categories. The County engaged the public volunteers in this way to ensure that funds are directed towards the communities most impacted by the pandemic.

Evaluation Committee members represented the County's racial, economic, and geographic diversity. All team members were trained in the criteria as set forth in the Department of Treasury guidance to ensure appropriate use of funds and the promotion of equitable outcomes.

Labor Practices

The County supports and encourages strong employment opportunities for workers, including both living wages and prevailing wages.

Use of Evidence

Where applicable, the County supports the use of evidence-based interventions in SLFRF-funded projects. See details for use of evidence-based criteria in the Project Inventory section below.

Performance Report

The County's SLFRF fund has a dedicated program manager who is tasked with managing expenditures, reviewing individual project performance reports, and submitting reports required by Treasury.

During the open application period, the County required applicants to describe anticipated measurable outcomes for the project and how the agency planned to ensure that measurements are valid and reliable. Awarded projects are required to report their progress on these measurements to the County on a quarterly basis. Examples of key performance indicators can be found in **Table A**.

Project “92021068”: Support Services for Veterans at The Whitehall Apartments

Funding Amount: \$23,625

Project Expenditure Category: 2.34 (Assistance to Impacted Nonprofit Organizations)

Project Overview:

- The Whitehall Apartments is a 48-unit permanent supportive housing development providing homes for formerly homeless and at-risk veterans.
- An onsite Resident Services Coordinator oversees a robust services program, including one-on-one support for residents, onsite programming, social and community events, and community partnerships. Combined, these services help to support veterans in their work to live healthy, independent lives in the community.
- Chester County SLFRF Funds were used to support resident services programming on site at The Whitehall Apartments.

A Haven

Project “92021111”: Sustainability for A Haven

Funding Amount: \$32,500.00

Project Expenditure Category: 1.12 (Mental Health Services)

Project Overview:

- A Haven supports grieving children with a family-centered approach. Services include grief support groups for teens and parents, grief consultation, and more.
- Chester County SLFRF Funds were used to hire new clinical staff to support the rapid growth A Haven has experienced due to the COVID-19 public health crisis.

Use of Evidence:

- The entire funding amount was used for evidence-based interventions.
- The first key approach built into A Haven’s grief groups is a Family Centered Approach, based on the knowledge that to support grieving children well, their significant adults must also be well supported. This knowledge has been affirmed in research showing that when adults are empowered in supporting their grieving child(ren), family bonds are

improved, and children and adults work together instead of in isolation to process the loss.¹

- Additionally, a Family Centered Approach normalizes the experience of each individual family member having a unique grief experience. Research has shown that when families are able to make space for the reality that each member will have a different grief experience, despite being members of the same family, there is decreased pain and increased ability to reorganize the family unit and reinvest in each other following the death.²
- The second key approach built into A Haven's grief groups is Peer to Peer connection. Onsite groups are structured so that each individual has designated time with their direct peers in age based sub-groups (including adults). School groups are structured so that students are close in age and developmental ability. The benefits of these peer and social supports are also affirmed in research. A 2014 systematic literature review found consistently that individuals who had access to peer support following a death reported less isolation and increased feelings of personal growth and positive life meaning.³

Aevidum

Project "92021101": Aevidum: A Student-Driven Youth Mental Health & Suicide Prevention Initiative

Funding Amount: \$132,750.00

Project Expenditure Category: 1.12 (Mental Health Services)

Project Overview:

- Aevidum works closely with Downingtown Area School District to plan a mental health and suicide prevention training for Chester County School Districts.
- Chester County SLFRF funds are being used to provide free, student-driven solutions to help combat the mental health challenges faced by students.

Use of Evidence:

- No evidence-based interventions are used in this project.

Performance Report:

- Events continue to be held, including a successful Strides Against Stigma 5K at Fugett Middle School in May 2025.

Alianzas de Phoenixville

Project “92021093”: Clinical Trauma Counseling Program

Funding Amount: \$50,000.00

Project Expenditure Category: 1.12 (Mental Health Services)

Project Overview:

- Alianzas de Phoenixville provides free services to under-resourced immigrants experiencing the before, during, and aftereffects of forced migration due to extreme poverty, violence, government corruption, sex trafficking, rape, and gross violation of human rights.
- Clients are uninsured and below poverty income levels. Therapy is provided at no cost to the client by culturally competent clinicians and support staff. Services are available in the day hours as well as evenings, both in-person and remote.
- Chester County SLFRF Funds were used for contracted therapists for one-on-one, group, and therapy sessions.

Use of Evidence:

- The entire funding amount was used for evidence-based interventions.
- Alianzas de Phoenixville uses three evidence-based interventions: Cognitive Behavioral Therapy, Psychodynamics, and Motivational Interviewing.
- Cognitive Behavior Therapy: Studies that do indicate CBT is effective for ethno-racial minorities have used culturally adapted approaches, such as conducting the intervention using the client’s ethnic language, integrating cultural elements into treatment, or using same-race groups.
- Psychodynamics: Psychotherapy, such as the importance of mourning, separation, loss, and trauma, are explored from a culturally informed psychoanalytic perspective where sociocultural factors are at the forefront in therapy.
- Motivational Interviewing: Motivational interviewing is particularly effective in treating Latino individuals by adopting the values of respeto (respect and mutual deference), confianza (trust and intimacy in a relationship), and personalismo (a style of communication that indicates a preference for developing relationships with individuals rather than with institutions) when taking a motivational interviewing approach to promote a better outcome.

Atglen Public Library

Project “92021055”: Programming Expansion Project

Funding Amount: \$8,750.00

Project Expenditure Category: 6.1 (Provision of Government Services)

Project Overview:

- Like many of Chester County’s libraries, Atglen Public Library experienced a reduction in activity and revenue due to the COVID-19 public health crisis. In response, the library

has expanded its programming capabilities to account for more programming that would be accessible should there be a resurgence of Covid or another virus.

- Chester County SLFRF Funds were used for supplies for outdoor programming, purchase of Spanish-language picture books, STEM kits, museum passes, and a new sign for the building.

- No evidence-based interventions were used in this project.

Funding Amount: \$45,200.75

Project Expenditure Category: 1.9 (COVID-19 Assistance to Non-Profits)

Project Overview:

- Like many fire companies that rely on a volunteer base to provide services, Avondale Fire Company experienced challenges in maintaining staffing due to the COVID-19 public health crisis. This forced Avondale Fire Company to rely more on its paid staff.
- Chester County SLFRF Funds were used to assist with payroll expenses to maintain daytime staffing for fire response and 2 ambulances.
- The total award for this project, including all Project Expenditure Categories, was \$90,401.50.

Project Overview:

- Like many fire companies that rely on a volunteer base to provide services, Avondale Fire Company experienced challenges in maintaining staffing due to the COVID-19 public health crisis. This forced Avondale Fire Company to rely more on its paid staff.
- Chester County SLFRF Funds were used to assist with payroll expenses to maintain daytime staffing for fire response and 2 ambulances.
- The total award for this project, including all Project Expenditure Categories, was \$90,401.50.

Barnstone Art for Kids

Project “92021097”: On the Go, Emerging Voices, Power of Art Programs

Funding Amount: \$15,000.00

Project Expenditure Category: 1.12 (Mental Health Services)

Project Overview:

- The primary work of Barnstone Art for Kids centers on providing children who have experienced trauma with a meaningful and supportive connection using the power of art and art making, as well as connection to trained, nurturing volunteer Mentor.
- Barnstone Art has three primary programs: On the Go, Emerging Voices (EV), and Power of Art (POA).
- This work resonated with the public since the onset of the pandemic, and Barnstone Art saw an increase in enrollment. COVID-19 and the subsequent disruptions represent a world-wide trauma event, and Barnstone Art for Kids has been a leader in addressing the needs of impacted children and advocating for the mental health issues resultant from the pandemic.
- Chester County SLFRF Funds were used for staffing and supplies.

Use of Evidence:

- The entire funding amount was used for evidence-based interventions.
- The therapeutic elements to these programs are supported in psychological research and are an effective intervention for mitigating the symptoms of trauma.
- The use of art therapy and mentors in the treatment of childhood trauma are established, evidence supported interventions. Art therapy has long been held as effective for children as they are a population that benefits from strategies that do not rely on traditional "talk" therapies. Art therapy is linked to improved self-esteem and self-awareness, improved cognition and sensory-motor functioning, reduction of distress, improved social skill development, and emotional resilience.
- Specific to the treatment of trauma, art therapy has been found to produce positive outcomes as well, especially if the sessions are delivered for over 8 weeks.

Borough of Kennett Square

Project “92021121”: Borough Pump Station Improvement

Funding Amount: \$500,000.00

Project Expenditure Category: 5.1 (Clean Water: Centralized Wastewater Treatment)

Project Overview:

- One of the Borough of Kennett Square's primary well-water treatment facilities is antiquated and has a high likelihood of failing. The facility and equipment do not offer the desired safety, redundancy, and treatment features that are standard with newer facilities. The Borough is constructing a new facility near the well and decommissioning the existing facility.
- Chester County SLFRF Funds are being used to assist in the engineering and construction of the new facility.

Use of Evidence:

- No evidence-based interventions are used in this project.

Performance Report:

- This project is currently in the design and permitting phase. Survey and site assessments are completed. Design is ongoing with 60% design completed by September 2025 and 90% design complete by October 2025.
- Project construction is expected to begin in spring 2026. Operations are expected to begin in fall 2026.

Borough of Kennett Square

Project "92021123": Kennett Library Revitalization

Funding Amount: \$350,000.00

Project Expenditure Category: 6.1 (Provision of Government Services)

Project Overview:

- The Kennett Library is a newly constructed state-of-the-art facility. The mission of this project was to build upon this by creating safe and aesthetically welcoming motor and pedestrian travel.
- Chester County SLFRF funds were used to assist the Borough with improvements including – Installation of seven (7) ADA compliant ramps; Redesign of all crosswalks; Creation of a speed table for the midblock ADA crossing; Milling and paving of the adjacent roadway; Addition of sidewalks in areas void or in poor condition.

Borough of West Chester

Funding Amount: \$600,000.00

Project Expenditure Category: 5.1 (Clean Water: Centralized Wastewater Treatment)

Project Overview:

- This mission of this project is to replace and modernize the electrical infrastructure powering the Borough of West Chester's Goose Creek wastewater treatment plant. This is the Borough's largest wastewater plant and serves most of the Borough, including the West Chester University campus, off-campus student housing, 1,227 households, and 47 commercial and industrial customers.
- Chester County SLFRF Funds are being used to assist in the necessary upgrades to this facility.

Use of Evidence:

- No evidence-based interventions are used in this project.

Performance Report:

- Preliminary engineering and bid design are underway.
- Construction is expected to begin in December 2025. Operations are expected to begin in February 2026.

- The Chester County Economic Development Foundation’s (CCEDF) Targeted Training for Minority- and Women-Owned Small Businesses program provides micro-grants to eligible small businesses for targeted skill development and business enhancement services.
- Chester County SLFRF Funds are being used to support this program and enhance the workforce and economic recovery by ensuring newly formed businesses in Chester County have the knowledge, resources, and training needs to be successful workers and business owners.

- 58 individuals have received assistance applying for SNAP.

Project “92021058”: Thorndale Food Delivery and Workforce Program Expansion

Funding Amount: \$450,000.00

Project Expenditure Category: 2.34 (Assistance to Impacted Nonprofit Organizations)

Project Overview:

- The Chester County Food Bank, in collaboration with Handi-crafters, is establishing a model food pantry in Thorndale.
- The goal of this project is to accomplish the following:
 - A choice, store-like pantry open to the public three days per week
 - Workforce development opportunities for the clients of Handi-crafters to increase their job readiness skills for gainful employment
 - Supported employment for the Chester County Food Bank FreshSTART kitchen culinary students to perform the skills to operate the Handi-crafters kitchen with a café daily.
- Chester County SLFRF funds are being used to support this pilot project.

Use of Evidence:

- The entire funding amount is being used for evidence-based interventions.
- As a partner of the National Restaurant Association’s Restaurant Ready program, the Chester County Food Bank’s curriculum is designed to meet the six core competency areas defined by the industry. In addition to culinary arts instruction and training, the program focuses on self-empowerment (value systems, time management, attitude, communication) and job readiness (resume building, mock interviewing, computer literacy, professional goal setting, interpersonal relationships). The class is concluded

with an internship and job placement opportunity where students put their newly developed skills into action in the workplace.

Performance Report:

- Program alumni work opportunities include the Thorncroft Horse Show and the Beyond Hunger Appreciation Event.
- The food pantry regularly serves 100-140 families per week.
- Demographics for HCOC Cohorts:
 - 30% Black/African American
 - 70% White
- Demographics for Culinary Workforce Cohorts:
 - 50% Black/African American
 - 15% Hispanic
 - 35% White

Chester County Intermediate Unit

Project “92021048”: The Project for Mental Health and Optimal Development (PMHOD)

Funding Amount: \$488,201.40

Project Expenditure Category: 1.12 (Mental Health Services)

Project Overview:

- The Project for Mental Health and Optimal Development, based at Penn’s Graduate School of Education, explores the relationship between mental health and optimal development among children, youth, and the adults who support them. The project has an array of school-based programs and research projects that aim to support all stakeholders in K-12 communities, but the focus of this application is the Consortium for Mental Health and Optimal Development.
- The Consortium aids school district teams in developing and implementing strategic plans that comprehensively and proactively address mental health and optimal development goals and programming in, across, and beyond their district.
- Chester County SLFRF Funds were used to support the program throughout Chester County.

Use of Evidence:

- The entire funding amount was used for evidence-based interventions.
- The approach used in the consortium is grounded in research and guided by experts in the field of mental health from the University of Pennsylvania.

Performance Report:

- This project is complete.
- Post-program survey data has shown:
 - 56% of participants believe their district is very effective in understanding the mental health needs of students, while all participants believe their district is at least somewhat effective.
 - 97% believe their district is at least somewhat effective in meeting students’ mental health needs – 24% reported very effective.

- Anxiety was cited by 91% of team members as being one of the top three mental health concerns for students.
 - Only 35% of participants believe their district is very able to address the issue of students' anxiety.
- 82% of participants believe their district is at least somewhat effective in understanding the mental health needs of employees, though 32% believe their district is not very effective at meeting those needs.
- 50% of participants specifically mentioned the Toolkit as one of the most helpful topics/resources covered in the Consortium this year.
- 94% of participants believe they have both the knowledge and ability to address the mental health needs of students, however 24% believe the work they do has no impact.

Chester County Intermediate Unit

Project "92021049": E3 (Exit, Enter, Employ) Program

Funding Amount: \$318,232.50

Project Expenditure Category: 2.10 (Assistance to Unemployed or Underemployed Workers)

Project Overview:

- The E3 (Exit, Enter, Employ) Program was created to help reduce recidivism in Chester County, support business growth, and develop a diverse and engaged workforce.
- The program consists of three components:
 - Manufacturing Training: 50 hours of foundational knowledge and skills for entry level work
 - Cognitive Behavioral Therapy: 60 hours of training to create positive cognitive restructuring.
 - Job Readiness Skills: 75 hours of training to help participants learn skills related to conflict resolution, stress management, teamwork, computer programs, and other job retention strategies.
- Participants must have prior judicial system involvement and be aged 18 or older.
- Chester County SLFRF Funds are being used to support this program.

Use of Evidence:

- The entire funding amount is being used for evidence-based interventions.
- This project uses industry-standard mental health therapy approaches such as cognitive behavioral therapy.
- Studies show that stable employment is a key factor in reducing recidivism.

Performance Report:

- Since January 2023, there have been 20 cohorts with 96 graduates.
- Certifications received:
 - PennDOT Flagger – 88
 - OSHA – 97
 - Customer Service – 63
 - Financial Workshops – 232
- 263 graduates are employed (not all have been released yet)

- Program graduates exhibit a 2% recidivism rate.

Chester County Intermediate Unit

Project “92021050”: Rhithm Implementation in Chester County School Districts

Funding Amount: \$227,675.50

Project Expenditure Category: 1.12 (Mental Health Services)

Project Overview:

- The Rhithm application program is designed to provide educators with a web-based tool to make more informed decisions to empower educators, administrators, and clinical staff in identifying risk and patterns of risk to promote and safeguard the well-being of students.
- Rhithm provides the opportunity for daily check-ins that assist in identifying ongoing issues students are facing, as opposed to segmented and isolated points in time.
- Chester County SLFRF Funds are being used to purchase the Rhithm app for 86,000 students and 6,000 educators in Chester County.

Use of Evidence:

- The entire funding amount is being used for evidence-based interventions.
- This project uses industry-standard mental health treatment techniques.

Performance Report:

- CCIU has not yet been able to secure a school district partnership.
- The County of Chester is currently exploring options to cancel this project and redistribute the funding to other approved projects.

Chester County Juvenile Probation

Project “92021018”: Family Intervention Unit Therapist

Funding Amount: \$240,860

Project Expenditure Category: 6.1 (Provision of Government Services)

Project Overview:

- During the pandemic, the Chester County Department of Juvenile Probation (JPO) has seen a significant increase in youth and family behavioral health crises and requests for counseling services.
- The additional demands have stressed community-based providers, causing extensive waiting lists and long delays before services can begin.
- Chester County SLFRF Funds are being used to hire a therapist to take on additional referrals and/or provide immediate intervention services until community-based services become available.

Use of Evidence:

- The full amount of this award is used to provide Cognitive Behavioral Therapy.

Performance Report:

- In this reporting period, 67 new referrals for family counseling services were received. 35 (52%) were assigned to the SLFRF-funded therapist.
- In total, the SLFRF-funded therapist conducted sessions with 44 unique individuals over 358 sessions.
- Demographic information for the 44 individuals includes:
 - 63.6% between the ages of 15 and 17
 - 100% male
 - 80.82% Black
 - 8.4% Hispanic/Latino

Funding Amount: \$10,374,824.00

Project Expenditure Category: 6.1 (Provision of Government Services)

Project Overview:

- The goals for this project are to:
 - Establish a mental health crisis call center
 - Establish mobile crisis teams to respond to crises
 - Create a business plan for a new urgent mental health care center
 - Build capacity and infrastructure for ongoing system improvement

Use of Evidence:

- Mobile Crisis Resolution Teams (MCRTs) services integrate evidence-based, equity-driven, culturally responsive services that respond to the unique cultural needs of bicultural/bilingual, racially/culturally distinct, and gender expressive/sexually diverse populations; including developmentally appropriate services that meet the specific needs of people with disabilities, veterans, seniors, children, and youth. The MCRT program also submits quarterly reports of evidence-based programs employed during service provisions.
- For the Behavioral Health Crisis Contact Center, which had its soft launch on March 27th, our Safety Assessment and Safety Plan - The Columbia Suicide Severity Rating Scale (C-SSRS) - is evidence-based and meets the Suicide and Crisis Lifeline requirements for Vibrant Emotional Health. The C-SSRS is also a recommended tool in the Zero Suicide Toolkit, a resource noted in the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Administration’s (SAMHSA) Evidence-Based Practices Resource Center.⁴

Performance Report:

- County-wide, 24/7 mobile crisis services are connecting individuals to support while reducing exposure to trauma and its long-term impact.

- The program began on December 17, 2021, and was completed in the first quarter of 2023.

- Nationwide, many of the largest single-site outbreaks of COVID-19 were in jails and prisons. People who live in correctional settings were at a high risk of exposure to COVID-19.
- COVID-19 vaccinations are an evidence-based intervention proven to reduce the spread of COVID-19 and decrease the risk of serious illness and death.
- The goal of the Chester County Prison Vaccine Incentive Program was to protect this vulnerable population by mitigating the spread of COVID-19 through the administration of vaccines.
- In a report titled "Examples of Evidence-Based Solutions to Increase Vaccine Confidence and Uptake," the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention lists monetary

incentives for vaccination as a solution to address low vaccination rates in targeted populations.⁵

Community Warehouse Project of Chester County

Project “92021090”: Delivery Services to Clients

Funding Amount: \$100,000.00

ACEs are traumatic events that occur before a child reaches the age of 18. ACEs include all types of abuse and neglect, such as parental substance use, incarceration, and domestic violence. ACEs can also include situations that may cause trauma for a child, such as having a parent with a mental illness or being part of a family going through a divorce.
- A landmark study in the 1990s found a significant relationship between the number of ACEs a person experienced and a variety of negative outcomes in adulthood, including poor physical and mental health, substance use, and risky behaviors.¹² The more ACEs experienced, the greater the risk for these outcomes. YoungMoms uses this tool to help identify additional referrals that should be made on the young mom’s behalf, such as the Crime Victim Services center.
