# **General Overview**



# **Executive Summary**

On March 11, 2021, the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) was signed into law and established the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) program. The program is intended to support state, territorial, local and Tribal governments in their efforts to address the economic and public health impacts of COVID-19 on our communities, residents and businesses.

In response to the COVID-19 public health emergency, the County of Hidalgo applied for its allocation of the SLFRF program and was granted a total of \$212,973,405.00. The County of Hidalgo received half of the allotted funds in June 2021. The second tranche was received in June 2022.

The Hidalgo County Department of Budget and Management established its American Rescue Plan Act Program in September 2021. The program performs comprehensive reviews of guidance provided by the U.S. Department of the Treasury, prepares materials in response to requests for program information and executes required reports. Additionally, the Hidalgo County ARPA Section is responsible for project analysis, planning, development and implementation.

Hidalgo County's American Rescue Plan Act Program functions as the core of the County's SLFRF program management and works to enable COVID-19 mitigation tactics and economic recovery efforts. The Hidalgo County American Rescue Plan Act Program is committed to maintaining accountability and transparency as it addresses the health and economic impacts of the COVID-19 public health emergency.

In accordance with the U.S. Department of the Treasury's Compliance and Reporting Guidance, the Hidalgo County 2023 Recovery Plan Performance Report has been developed to inform the public and U.S. Treasury of Hidalgo County's SLFRF projects. All current and past Project and Expenditure Reports and Recovery Plan Performance Reports are available via the website.

Hidalgo County Recovery Plan Performance Reports detail the scope of current and past SLFRF projects, expand upon the County's efforts to engage the community and underscores the importance of abiding by guidance provided by the U.S. Treasury in order to ensure an efficient, equitable and effective recovery from the COVID-19 public health emergency.

The State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) program allocation allowed Hidalgo County to begin its strategic development plan to expeditiously respond to the COVID-19 public health emergency. The SLFRF, which supports state and local governments' response to COVID-19 and its effects, has allowed the County to take a dedicated and intentional approach to addressing the COVID-19 public health emergency's disproportionate impacts on County residents. Simultaneously, federal funds have also granted the opportunity to respond to the long-standing socioeconomic disparities among underserved communities.

Since its inception, the Department of Budget and Management American Rescue Plan Act

(ARPA) Program has strategically operated to expend funds in compliance with the SLFRF Final Rule and Compliance and Reporting Guidance. The program is currently overseeing the expenditure of funds and ensuring that projects are executed in a manner that is equitable, efficient and effective.

In 2021, the County of Hidalgo launched efforts for economic recovery by prioritizing public health services, healthcare initiatives, public safety measures, recreational development and improvements to stormwater systems. Public health measures continue to be the focal point of the County's COVID-19 recovery. Meanwhile, projects aimed at addressing recreational spaces in Qualified Census Tracts (QCTs) and stormwater systems promote healthy lifestyles, public safety and an improved quality of life in the community that is sustainable and benefits all.

Hidalgo County has two primary goals; to provide assistance to its residents and to provide support for the community, particularly the disadvantaged population who have suffered the most through the pandemic residing in Qualified Census Tract (QCT) or Low to Moderate Income areas.

Hidalgo County is committed to service and intent on ensuring that the American Rescue Plan funds accelerate recovery and build a stronger foundation for the future as evidenced by our Vision and Mission statements as well as our values.

**Vision:** Hidalgo County will provide efficient government services for long lasting investments, rebuild reserves to enhance financial stability and lead our community toward success.

**Mission:** To serve our constituents by building a strong and healthy community through continuous engagement, assistance and access and/or distribution of services to adversely affected groups in Hidalgo County.

**Values:** Integrity, Excellence, Equity, Innovation, Transparency

- Integrity: Demonstrate honesty, trustworthiness and sincerity at all times
- Excellence: Provide exceptional service and surpassing expectations
- Equity: Provide fair, impartial assistance to individuals who are served by the County

Research into the Social Determinants of Health indicates areas of priority that require assistance because they have an impact on a person's health, well-being, and quality of life and impact social, physical, and economic conditions. Hidalgo County aims to focus its resources and efforts on programs and services that will be accessible and influence health and economic outcomes. Eligible uses of funds integrated with the specific needs of Hidalgo County and its constituents will allow the County to better support and serve the community for a resilient future. To provide efficient government services for long lasting investments and leverage health equity, the areas below have been prioritized.



Our Commissioners Court understands that recovery efforts are imperative for the community and has implemented both immediate relief and long-term projects. Outcomes are focused on closing gaps in disproportionately impacted communities. Addressing these priorities, will encourage and promote economic stability in Hidalgo County as these investments support long-term growth and opportunity. Clearly, projects tap into more than one category making a greater impact on results. As seen in the charts below, Hidalgo County is vested, first and foremost, in the health of its residents and in ensuring that investments are in the interest of community resilience with approximately 60% of funding geared toward public health and negative economic impacts.

# **ARPA Revised Amounts**



#### 1. Public Health

Hidalgo County began a comprehensive response to the COVID-19 pandemic and its impacts on the public health system. Efforts included investing in health care access in indigent communities, addressing congregate settings in County workspaces and jails, and strengthening the County's response to COVID-19 to ensure that its residents received and continue to receive high quality care to improve community health and well-being.

In 2021, Hidalgo County focused on immediate relief by providing services for all constituents to ensure public safety and reduce health impacts, including announcements, vaccinations and other provisions necessary to reduce the spread of the disease and save lives. Additionally, equipment to improve and enhance broadband infrastructures for distance learning, work, and for emergency response were also implemented.

In 2022, Hidalgo County focused on the same mitigation efforts to continue providing vaccinations. In planning for the future, projects that would prepare the county for response and recovery now and in the future were assessed and included public facilities and health clinics retrofitting to modernize and improve service delivery, investing in nursing programs to increase the number of

nurses, new construction of clinics in qualified census tract areas for closer access and treatment, and emergency preparedness projects such as emergency response resources and first responder training in preparation for and in response to the current and future public health emergencies.

Now in recovery, 2023 projects are focused on the lingering effects of the pandemic while still continuing mitigation efforts. The County expanded projects for improvements to clinics, assisted with resources for the County's new biosafety lab to promote community safety, provided mental health assistance relief to the University of Texas Rio Grande Valley, and expanded investments in nursing and respiratory health to increase the number of both graduating nurses and respiratory therapists.

Hidalgo County plans to continue addressing health inequities and create more sustainable communities. Projects with the eligibility categories below are a priority and align with the Health Care Access and Quality outcomes.

- Vaccination Efforts (1.1): vaccination clinics, temporary vaccination healthcare staffing, expanded medical records healthcare staffing, hardware and software, temporary site rental, mobile sprinter vans, personal protective equipment
- Testing Efforts (1.2, 1.5): supplies and equipment
- Congregate Settings Mitigation Efforts (1.4)
- Public facilities social distancing measures
- Vaccination Campaigns, Technology improvements, Emergency Management Resources (1.7, 1.8)
- Mental Health Services (1.12)
- Clinic Improvements/new construction, increase nursing healthcare capacity (nursing), first responder training, cybersecurity, biosafety efforts (1.14)

In 2024, Hidalgo County sought to finalize its efforts aimed toward public health by ensuring the obligation of funds on current projects; thereby affirming their completion and long-term sustainability.

By implementing and finalizing public health projects in response to COVID-19, Hidalgo County aims to restore, recover and remain resilient in the years to come.

# 2. Negative Economic Impacts

The COVID-19 public health emergency has collectively impaired the psyches of Americans. Pandemic-related stress exacerbated behavioral health difficulties, depression, anxiety and substance use to name a few. Furthermore, families were affected by resource depletion, job loss and food insecurity, specifically in our disproportionately impacted communities. To begin reversing these effects and build a stronger community, Hidalgo County focused on the drawn out

effects of the pandemic by providing direct assistance and collaborating with nonprofit organizations (NPO), investing in outdoor recreation spaces and areas, and community resource centers and recreational facilities.

In 2021, immediate relief was aimed at providing services centered around meeting basic needs for all constituents, specifically our most vulnerable populations. We provided direct assistance to the Food Bank of the RGV for meal deliveries and to a struggling emergency service provider as EMS services were a highly needed and life-saving service, particularly in unincorporated areas of the County. Additionally, a clinic located in the center of a qualified census tract area was assisted to provide primary care, mental health and other services necessary to address both primary care and mental health. Hidalgo County also implemented its own community centered projects revolving around healthy recreation and play including park improvements, trails, and recreational facilities that include modern, more inclusive equipment. These efforts were aimed at fulfilling safety, psychological, and behavioral needs that contribute to healthy, happy, and successful lives.

In 2022, Hidalgo County continued its nonprofit collaborations for primary care and mental health, incorporated therapy training to reach more individuals and added other NPOs that provided student-centered projects to provide learning support and a fine arts curriculum as research has shown that skills development aids in academic achievement, which may have been impeded due to school closures. Two local school districts also implemented mental youth camps to provide mental health support from pandemic related stressors as well as the fears and anxieties of going back to school. One nonprofit is tasked with providing housing support services/repairs to prevent poor quality housing in qualified census tracts. The connection between one's home and health has been a longstanding matter and may magnify illness. To combat unemployment, the County is in the process of developing a community resource center that will provide workforce assistance, educational services, child care, access to assistance and referral services and collaborations with local organizations to address the diverse employability needs of our marginalized population. That is why the aforementioned programming is critical to overall health recovery as individuals are afforded the opportunity to develop workforce readiness, social, emotional, and coping skills to alleviate life's challenges and have an impact on overall health and well-being.

In 2023, support for primary care and mental health are still ongoing. The addition of walking trails in qualified census tracts and low-to-moderate income areas aims to provide opportunities for health and well-being activities to these communities. To provide a safe and nourishing environment, assistance to a nonprofit recreational facility for repairs and improvements was provided to allow for the continuation of services to youth in the areas of learning, homework, and social skills development. Also, the expansion of recreational facilities and trails in low to moderate income areas were included to increase community participation and youth development.

In 2024, Hidalgo County is continuing its effort to address the drawn out effects of the pandemic by providing nonprofit assistance for facility repairs and improvements so that nonprofits are able to continue providing services in the areas of domestic violence, child abuse, and a food pantry that provides warm meals to over 800 individuals weekly to disproportionately impacted populations. Additionally, Hidalgo County is continuing with park and trail projects and a wellness and community center. These projects are all aimed at providing needs-based services and provide mental, physical, and behavioral relief.

In 2025, Hidalgo County added Veteran support to the non-profit program to ensure there is no interruption in services for our veterans and affordable housing to provide access to safe, decent and stable housing to our most vulnerable population.

Hidalgo County plans to continue addressing health inequities and create more sustainable communities. Projects with the eligibility categories below are a priority and align with the Neighborhood and Built Environment outcomes.

- Workforce Assistance Community Resource Center (2.10)
- Housing Support and Affordable Housing (2.18, 2.15)
- Parks, Trails, Recreation Facilities (2.22)
- Mental Health Relief (2.26)
- Nonprofit assistance (2.29, 2.34)
- Nonprofit assistance food, primary care, mental health, learning strategies (2.34)

To foster a resilient and equitable economic recovery, Hidalgo County is addressing the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on vulnerable populations by addressing issues related to poverty, homelessness, mental health and neighborhood development. Measures taken to assist those who suffered the worst of the pandemic align with the County's goal of promoting equity among communities while enhancing the quality of life and fostering community growth. Hidalgo County will continue investing in projects that promote healthier living environments particularly, those that have been impacted and have experienced negative economic impacts.

# 3. Public Health-Negative Economic Impact: Public Sector Capacity

Most local governments were presented with substantial challenges brought upon by the COVID-19 pandemic as the traditional face-to-face service and other critical systems were disrupted by stay at home ordinances. Hidalgo County, too, was negatively impacted by such closures. Intent on guiding the community out of the COVID-19 crisis, the County placed emphasis on being accessible and resourceful. Embracing change and adjusting to the challenges was the only solution to remain connected with the public and to restore public health and safety. Communication became key. Projects designed to build internal capacity and improve technology infrastructure became critical

in the continuation of services. Additionally, to maintain human capital and boost morale, Hidalgo County prioritized and implemented projects to support government employment assuring essential service delivery.

In 2021, Hidalgo County enhanced Wi-Fi and telephone connectivity in a public facility providing employees and constituents with increased efficiency and facilitation of government processes. Continued planning and research took place, keeping both community and employee health and safety in mind.

In 2022, the County recruited public health personnel for the outbreak response and other essential medical services for the adult detention facility. An overtime project for public health employees was also initiated in response to the public outcry for testing and vaccinations. The health and human services department purchased software and hardware for records maintenance and enlisted staff dedicated to data entry records digitization. Equally important was the addition of a Deputy Emergency Management Coordinator to assist in planning and implementing pandemic safety operations and preparing for future emergencies. To make digital content more available to everyone, a web accessibility application was implemented with assistive features such as text-to-speech, reading and translation support to reduce barriers between the digital content and our diverse community. Technology played a key part in the transformation of County operations. Human resources and public safety management software was acquired to streamline operations. To minimize the risk of unauthorized access, cybersecurity was upgraded to safeguard sensitive information and maintain continuous operations in tandem with the Google Workspace which made it easier for remote and collaborative work. Compensating employees and modernizing technology were strategies geared at worker retention, internal and external uninterrupted services, facilitating public safety, and establishing systems that could operate both in crisis and conventional settings. Our goals were to alleviate anxieties, sustain operations and productivity, and disseminate key information for effective service delivery.

In 2023, in addition to continuing the aforementioned projects, Hidalgo County sought to expand effective service delivery by upgrading outdated hardware and software countywide to streamline operations. Furthermore, to mitigate academic, social, mental and fiscal needs, community navigators were recruited to identify barriers, research programs and services, and support public health. Hidalgo County initiated a broadband feasibility study to detail access in the jurisdiction, specifically in unincorporated, underserved or unserved areas to expand broadband capability. This programming is designed to meet the needs of both the County and its constituents, maximizing efficiency and resources.

In 2024, Hidalgo County will continue with prior programming and research compensation strategies for public safety personnel as they continue to serve disproportionately impacted communities with the longstanding effects of COVID-19.

In 2025, Hidalgo County continues supporting payroll for law enforcement as they continue to respond to situations exacerbated by the pandemic including but not limited to domestic violence and mental health incidents. By building relationships with the community, law enforcement will improve community safety. The continuation of technology resources to streamline data processing, efficiency and productivity in daily activities will assist the County to timely meet resident demands.

Hidalgo County plans to continue addressing the negative economic impacts on public sector capacity to create more sustainable communities. Projects with the eligibility categories below are a priority and align with county operations.

- Technology improvements (3.1, 3.5)
- Payroll, Overtime (3.4)

The pandemic showed us that gaps in government infrastructure not only weakened our ability to provide essential services but also our economy. It is important to invest in resources and the workforce that keeps our economy going. Public sector recovery is vital to the community.

#### 4. Premium Pay

In 2021, Hidalgo County authorized premium pay programs to compensate essential employees who performed in person duties which heightened risks of COVID-19. This included regular full-time, regular part-time, temporary full-time, and temporary part-time employees who were hired on or before August 1, 2021.

The purpose of the programs was to provide pay to eligible employees who have been, and continue to be, relied on to maintain the operations of essential, critical infrastructure sectors, including those who are crucial to protecting the health and wellbeing of their communities. Employees teleworking from a residence are not eligible to receive Premium Pay. Premium Pay was awarded at a rate of \$13.00 per hour in addition to regular wages. Regular part-time and temporary-part time employees received 50% of the \$13.00 per hour pay rate once approved hours are met. Hidalgo County, Community Service Agency and Drainage District participated in this project and are complete for the year 2021.

In 2022, Hidalgo County authorized a second round of premium pay programs with the same guidelines but different tiers for the following entities: Hidalgo County, Community Service Agency, Head Start, Hidalgo County Drainage District and the Community Supervision and Corrections Department for regular full-time, regular part-time, temporary full-time, and temporary part-time employees who were hired on or before July 29, 2022. All five projects are complete.

# Premium Pay Totals



2021 Premium Pay tiers were as outlined below for full-time eligible employees.

This project was a critical component in compensating frontline employees for the services performed as it provided support to a critical workforce that helped to keep the County operational and serviceable.

#### 5. Infrastructure

The U.S. Treasury's CSLFRF final rule allows state and local governments to expend funds to enhance existing storm and wastewater infrastructure in order to recognize and address areas of critical need. Hidalgo County has an array of areas with limited or no access to clean water or viable stormwater systems. The aforementioned areas are often susceptible to flooding during rainy seasons. Most notably, low-income and minority communities often encounter considerable water inequities, such as increased lead exposure and risk of infection from exposure to debris and

contaminants. All in all, the streets, avenues and main roads of Hidalgo County are affected. To address environmental, social and economic factors, Hidalgo County is dedicated to improving stormwater management.

Currently, twenty two stormwater systems located in low-to-moderate income areas have been identified and one drinking water project. Fifteen stormwater projects have been completed and the rest are underway.

In response to the increased need for stable Wi-Fi access due to challenges brought by the COVID-19 public health emergency, Hidalgo County implemented several broadband projects to enhance Wi-Fi access and reach as the pandemic made technology a necessary provision. Hidalgo County's goal is to provide fair, impartial assistance to the constituents who require reliable high-speed internet access for work and learning.

To continue addressing health disparities and provide services for long lasting investments, Hidalgo County will continue its efforts in wastewater, stormwater and broadband infrastructure projects.

# 6. Revenue Replacement

The COVID-19 health emergency impacted Hidalgo County's ability to provide essential governmental services and support to its community members. As a result, the county prioritized projects that would minimize health risks, improve community access to broadband services, maintain County administrative services, and support public sector workforce initiatives.

Recipients had the option to elect a Standard Allowance or calculate revenue loss according to the outlined formula. As per US Treasury Final Rule, the law specifically limits funds to cover revenue losses that both are "due to the COVID—19 public health emergency" and could impact "the provision of government services." For these reasons, Hidalgo County elected to calculate its revenue loss allowance.

In 2021, as the COVID-19 pandemic was heightened, Hidalgo County adapted operations to mitigate the spread with debris management. Relief was aimed at reducing environmental contaminants that may exacerbate existing health disparities, thus Hidalgo County initiated a debris removal project to "clean-up" affected areas to protect human health and minimize environmental impacts by maintaining clean and safe public spaces. In addition, the Countywide Roadway Assessment project has also provided and improved safety conditions for community members. This project allowed the County to provide an accurate inventory of roads for effective maintenance and capitalization of roadways. To maintain services to constituents,

Hidalgo County implemented projects to address the increased need for remote learning and workplace telecommuting. Public Wi-Fi Pole Replacement and other equipment maintenance

provided much needed support to Hidalgo County residents by increasing connectivity and assisting citizens with distance learning and teleworking. The County was able to comply with COVID-19 health and safety guidelines in county buildings by retrofitting spaces with newer equipment, systems, technologies and safety features. This allowed the County to mitigate COVID-19 by creating safe working environments and implementing crucial social distancing measures. This programming was aimed at assuring that Hidalgo County residents had access to safe environments and tools to combat the pandemic.

Throughout 2022, Hidalgo County continued its efforts towards completion of these projects and took a deep dive into internal county operations to identify areas of need in service delivery of day-to-day operations. A provision in the Final Rule allows recipients experiencing budget shortfalls to use SLFRF funds to avoid cuts to government services and enables local governments to continue to provide valuable services and ensures that fiscal austerity measures do not hamper the broader economic recovery. Areas were identified for 2023.

For 2023, Hidalgo County expanded its project inventory with efforts geared toward community and County level needs. Environmental remediation, emergency response deployment in unincorporated areas, and communication were areas of focus to continue to provide valuable services, including waste management, emergency response (ambulance, fire, vehicle) services, and mail outs. Retrofits and other provisions for additional county buildings were also completed to provide safe environments. In response to a shortage of law enforcement personnel, an overtime project was initiated both to compensate personnel and assure public safety. These areas continue to be a priority for recovery from the pandemic to mitigate COVID-19, and it is the intention of Hidalgo County to remain fully operational.

In 2024, Hidalgo County sustains its efforts towards execution and completion of these projects. Continuous research of the needs of the community and local operations will help bridge gaps in community disparities and governmental services.

In 2025, Hidalgo County is focusing on completing the three remaining projects.

By prioritizing services that optimize support and resources, Hidalgo County addressed the provision of government services as they relate to critical infrastructure to strengthen and maintain a resilient system for overall well-being.

# **Promoting Equitable Outcomes**

Because Hidalgo County has many areas in Qualified Census Tracts (QCT) or Low-to-Moderate Income Areas (LMI), it was imperative that the County take measures to repair existing

inadequacies and prevent future ones as well. Households in QCTs are designated by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development as areas that have 50% of its households with incomes below 60% of the area median gross income. These residents face significant barriers and often lack access to essential supplies and services that would allow them to overcome the obstacles and hardships that the COVID-19 pandemic brought to the community. To address unfair disparities, Hidalgo County has taken an ambitious, whole-of-government approach to racial equity and support for underserved communities. Below are the QCT and LMI maps for Hidalgo County, respectively.





Creating opportunities for communities that are historically underserved, benefits everyone. The County recognizes that certain individuals within the community may face different barriers and continuously seeks to address such disparities to ensure residents have fair access to governmental services and resources during the COVID-19 pandemic and thereafter. The goals and targets below serve to bridge long-standing gaps and strengthen both community and economy.

The County focused on a systemic approach in its recovery efforts that would provide access, opportunity, and outreach to all its constituents, especially those residing in disproportionately impacted communities. Projects were identified and implemented by employing QCT and LMI mapping to target historically disadvantaged or marginalized populations. To prioritize long-term equity within the community, the County has implemented immediate relief and long-term measures to address crisis management and stabilization. As such, equity focused initiatives that provide access to primary care, mental health support, resources, and creating "neighborhood built environments" based in QCT and LMI areas to leverage inequities. This direct assistance to underserved populations increases accessibility to essential services.

To alert the community about the services provided by the SLFRF, Hidalgo County utilized centralized and systemic communication efforts. Partnerships with local news outlets, a media campaign consisting of television and radio ads, informational leaflets, and social media outlets to relay real-time data on COVID-19, vaccination efforts, primary and mental health care and services, and resources available. A web inclusive application (assistive features) was also initiated to make information available for a diverse population.

Still, many residents faced significant barriers in accessing information. According to the U.S. Census Bureau 20% of the local population does not have access to broadband internet, in addition, the Barbara Bush Foundation for Family Literacy reports a 54% literacy rate in Hidalgo County with the Rio Grande Valley having one of the lowest literacy scores in the country. Because the County has a high hispanic and latino population, these low rates primarily stem from the high percentage of non-English speakers. For this reason, it is important for the County to employ diverse ways of information distribution. The traditional modes of communication, email and phone remained steadfast.

Various recovery projects have helped to address the negative economic, health, and social impact that the COVID-19 pandemic has caused. Hidalgo County's goals towards equitable outcomes have helped to address the ongoing challenges associated with the COVID-19 pandemic and its lasting impacts on the local community and economy. The equity goals outlined by the Hidalgo County ARPA Program continue to bridge gaps in healthcare, build capacity within the County, and ensure the most vulnerable population is protected.

# **Community Engagement**

Hidalgo County is committed to achieving sustainable outcomes by actively working with and listening to public input to better understand community needs. This diverse input provides valuable insights, local knowledge, and personal experiences that can inform and shape viable solutions. Through various strategies and approaches, Hidalgo County collected and analyzed and synthesized data to prioritize and guide efforts in addressing community needs.

The key goal is to achieve equitable and impactful participation while gaining a more comprehensive understanding of the issues at hand. Aside from the traditional phone call, the County utilized various outreach methods including social media, surveys, and consultations.







In 2021, the County immediately utilized social media to educate and inform the community on immediate relief efforts including mass vaccination sites, stay at home ordinances, resources and

supplies, tracking the effects of COVID-19, and initiated an online survey to quickly generate time-sensitive data and provide support to those in need. An ARPA Email address is available.

In 2022, the County launched a survey (English and Spanish) to gather public opinion on the impacts of COVID-19 in Hidalgo County. With a predominantly 92.5% Hispanic population and a 33.5% poverty level, the County received a variety of responses. Survey respondents rated limited health care access and limited access to broadband internet as the greatest disparities exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic. In order to address concerns expressed by the community, the County began to implement projects that responded to the aforementioned socioeconomic inadequacies. These projects not only address these socioeconomic disparities, but also promote equitable outcomes among residents.

Moreover, constituents have been and continue to reach out to their County Precinct Commissioners relaying precinct specific concerns and the negative economic impacts the pandemic has posed on health, wastewater concerns, public areas and facilities, lack of mental health support and resources, and livelihood. This communication is ongoing with individuals, nonprofit organizations and businesses.

Overall, community engagement affords opportunities for learning and growth. Collective perspectives lead to more effective and tailored approaches and investments in the community's well-being. This ongoing collaboration provides current and relevant information regarding evolving needs and allows for adaptability and responsiveness to changing needs and priorities. Hidalgo County residents will have access to resources and opportunities to build resilience and enhance their quality of life.

#### **Labor Practices**

Hidalgo County is committed to ensuring that all federal and state labor guidelines and regulations are followed by the County and its subrecipients. It is vital to our economy that labor practices be followed to safeguard both employers and employees. Furthermore, following the procurement process guarantees cost savings and maximizes resources. The inclusion of contract provisions in the County's competitive bid documents contributes to environmental and social responsibility and supports economic recovery by maintaining transparency, accountability, impartiality and fairness.



#### **Use of Evidence**

Hidalgo County incorporated evidence-based interventions with the highest ratings in its recovery efforts. This practice helped to make informed decisions to promote positive outcomes and growth whilst discouraging ineffective practices. The approach was to quickly incorporate prevention and protection efforts proven to be highly successful to facilitate swift and effective long-term recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic. Evidence based efforts in the areas of public health and negative economic impacts will promote positive recovery, enhance well-being, and cultivate actions that can improve health and safety.

Thus far, funds have been allocated to nine evidence-based projects totaling \$46,871,543.54. Evidence-based models are in the areas of congregate settings, mental health, employment supports, housing assistance and educational disparities.



Hidalgo County understands that evidence based models have higher success rates and directly impact outcomes. To that end, these protective interventions will produce optimal outcomes by reducing health disparities, maximizing time and resources, and targeting root causes.



2024 Project Progress and Status





First responders must be able to communicate during day to day incidents and large scale emergencies Recent events, such as severe flooding and wildfires have highlighted the challenges in multi-agency coordination. For this reason, Hidalgo County EOC will invest in interoperability equipment. This system enhancement will address these challenges by: 1) enabling the integration of radio and other communication technologies to create a unified communication platform; 2) allowing multiple agencies to patch into the system simultaneously, thereby enhancing collaborative efforts during emergency operations; and 3) improving response times and operational efficiency during critical incidents. The system also facilitates real-time data sharing and communication linkage among first responders, including police, fire, and emergency medical services, ensuring a coordinated and timely response during emergencies. Enhancing our EOC's capabilities with interoperability equipment gateways will significantly bolster our region's emergency response infrastructure to insure our frontline continues to protect and serve the community effectively due to the long-term effects of COVID-19 and other disasters.



When it becomes necessary to mobilize emergency resources to disaster sites because rescue work is in progress and the health and safety of the community are threatened, specific procedures must be followed in order to prevent further spread of deadly, contagious diseases such as COVID-19. The provision and management of mass decedents proved difficult as hospital morgues reached full capacity. Therefore, it is important that action be taken in order to ensure the County is properly equipped for the safe, respectful storage and handling of decedents. Hidalgo County intends to meet surge capacity by ensuring adequate emergency preparedness equipment is at hand to meet increased numbers of sick and injured and implement core public health activities due to continuous and substantial utilization. The acquisition of emergency preparedness equipment such as refrigerated units and other necessary provisions will assist in fatality management and will provide the County with measures to address vital community based surge capacity.
