INGHAM COUNTY RECOVERY PLAN PERFORMANCE REPORT 2025

1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) includes \$56.8 million in direct local recovery assistance for Ingham County. The first half (First Tranche) was received in May, 2021 and the second half (Second Tranche) was received in June, 2022.

Ingham County's Recovery Plan fully complies with the U.S. Treasury Department's Final ARPA Rule. It guarantees that the County's direct ARPA assistance will be allocated prior to the December 31, 2024 deadline and that all ARPA expenditures will be completed by December 31, 2026, as required by federal law.

The Ingham County Board of Commissioners developed this plan to strategically allocate the \$56.8 million to help Ingham County fully recover and become a stronger county. Recognizing the need to kick start the County's recovery and address immediate needs, the Commissioners proposed two phases to allocate funding:

Phase I, First Tranche Funding: to address the immediate needs of Ingham County citizens and businesses that were adversely affected by COVID-19; and

Phase II, Second Tranche Funding: to address long-term solutions regarding affordable housing, critical infrastructure, and the County's financial stabilization.

Through June 30, 2025, the Ingham County Commissioners have allocated all \$56.8 million of the County's ARPA allocation with millions already distributed to the families and business owners in Ingham County including but not limited to:

- \$8.25 million to 360 small business owners
- \$1 million to 162 households for mortgage/utility assistance
- \$4.916 million to 674 households for direct assistance
- \$3.775 million in essential employee pay
- \$750,000 toward the development of neighborhood health center
- \$1 million for emergency service provider equipment upgrades
- \$6.357 million for low income housing

2. USE OF FUNDS

The Ingham County Commissioners recognized the needs of many of our County residents and businesses that suffered financially, physically and mentally during the COVID-19 pandemic. To address these needs, the Commissioners established the following priorities for ARPA funding:

• Public Health

o Improving access to healthcare, mental health, and addiction services

- o Providing a safe workplace through free COVID testing
- o Providing emergency funding to reduce gun violence

Negative Economic Impacts

- o Providing grants to small businesses
- o Providing mortgage/utility assistance
- o Providing direct assistance to citizens
- Providing apprenticeship training
- o Funding for low income housing

• Revenue Replacement

- Utilizing ARPA funding to offset revenue losses and fund some general governmental expenses
- o Funding for emergency service providers
- Funding for broadband expansion to County facilities and improvements to remote work

• Public Sector Capacity

- o Providing additional COVID-related paid sick leave
- o Hiring additional staff
- o Developing additional court capacity to address COVID-19 related backlogs

• Premium Pay

o Providing premium pay to essential County employees

• Water, Sewer, Broadband Infrastructure

- o Providing funding for stormwater management projects
- o Implementing a County-wide broadband survey to determine unserved/underserved areas of the County
- o Providing funding to fix/replace failing individual septic systems and wells

3. PROMOTING EQUITABLE OUTCOMES

The following projects are examples of the efforts taken by Ingham County and our partners to promote equitable outcomes with the use of our ARPA dollars:

Allen Neighborhood Center FQHC & Pharmacy/Health Center Position Staffing

The Allen Neighborhood Center serves as a dynamic hub where Lansing Eastside neighbors access resources to improve their health and well-being; expand their capacity to seize job and entrepreneurial opportunities; create a strong sense of place, belonging, and community pride; and build a safe, sustainable, and thriving neighborhood. The FQHC & Pharmacy will provide healthcare to all the residents of Lansing's Eastside regardless of their ability to pay.

Total FQHC and staffing allocation – \$887,956

Gun Violence Rapid Response

The City of Lansing is facing an epidemic of gun violence by and against historically marginalized groups. This funding will provide stop-gap measures to address the gun violence in Lansing until the implementation of the Advanced Peace Initiative. Funding to recipients will include education and outreach to impacted communities, conflict resolution services, non-police de-escalation supports and gaps in health plan coverage.

Total project allocation – \$25,000

Capital Area Community Services (CACS) – Financial Assistance to Residents

CACS works toward eliminating the causes and conditions of poverty in Ingham by providing programs in childhood education, nutrition, weatherization, housing, and financial counseling. CACS reaches the most vulnerable residents of our County and has served 404 households to date with ARPA funds.

<u>Total project allocation - \$5,000,000</u>

Capital Area Housing Partnership (CAHP) – Mortgage and Utility Assistance

Capital Area Housing Partnership develops strong, diverse neighborhoods with a focus on affordable housing, homeownership, and financial security in mid-Michigan. This project provided mortgage and utility assistance focused on residents under 80% AMI (Area Median Income).

- 162 households served
 - o 70 Black or African American
 - o 60 below 30% AMI
 - o 41 31%-50% AMI
 - o 59 51%-80% AMI

Total project allocation -\$1,000,000

Lansing Economic Area Development (LEAP) – Ingham County Sunrise Grant Program

LEAP worked closely with DEI Economic Development partners and community engagement specialists to reach historically underserved business owners/entrepreneurs. 630 grants totaling \$8,250,000 to date with a **54% award rate to underrepresented** (BIPOC-owned, woman-owned, veteran-owned, person-with-disability-owned, LGBTQ+ owned) groups.

Total project allocation - \$9,250,000

Opportunity Knox – Apprenticeship Training Program

Opportunity Knox is providing apprenticeship training in the building trades, inspection services and computer skills to underserved communities in the Greater Lansing area. Through extensive outreach through BIPOC network websites and social media, 80% of the 57 graduates to date have been minorities.

Total project allocation -\$500,000

Housing Trust Fund (HTF)

The HTF was established by the Ingham County Commissioners to, "Encourage construction, improvement and maintenance of accessible, sustainable housing in Ingham County in order to establish homeownership to build wealth and equity". HTF has allocated funding to the following projects:

Ingham County Health Department – Private Wastewater and Drinking Water Systems

Ingham County Health Department has an estimated 1,200 failing septic systems and an unknown number of failing private wells, many of which are in historically underserved areas. Priority for upgrades/replacements will be given to households whose total income is less than 300% of the Federal Poverty Level.

Total project allocation -\$1,000,000

4. **COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT**

The Ingham County Commissioners held multiple public committee/board meetings in which input from citizens on ARPA funding was requested. These meeting agendas were publicly posted and advertised.

Requests were sent to all 16 Ingham County townships, three cities and two villages to inquire about funding needs/projects.
