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GENERAL OVERVIEW

Executive Summary

The San Mateo County's Recovery Plan Report provides insight into the County's COVID-19 pandemic response efforts in 2021. Information is provided on expenditures, American Rescue Plan funding allocations, and programs being provided to County of San Mateo's residents and businesses.

The San Mateo County was awarded \$148,897,819 of State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) and received the first 50% payment of \$ 74,448,909 on May 20, 2021. The County should receive the second 50% payment of \$ 74,448,909.50 on May 20, 2022. Funds must be incurred by December 31, 2024 and expended by December 21, 2026. The County is committed to utilizing the \$148 million it will receive through the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 in an equitable manner.

The County is committed to COVID-19 Public Health response efforts, its economic recovery, supporting its social safety net, and improving the county infrastructure.

Uses of Funds

The Draft Recovery Plan shall be updated in the upcoming months as additional guidance (ARPA funds from the U.S. Department of Treasury) is received, additional information is obtained, and changes in priorities.

Supporting public health by funding COVID-19 mitigation efforts, medical expenses, behavioral healthcare, and certain public health and safety staff.

- Vaccination programs, testing, and contact tracing.
- Prevention in congregate setting – nursing homes, correctional facilities.
- Alternative care sites including non-congregate isolation sites to meet pandemic operational needs.
- Community Engagements.
- Payroll and other public health expenses.

Addressing negative economic impacts caused by the public health emergency, including economic harm to workers, households, small businesses, impacted industries.

- Aid to workers and families for food, housing or other financial insecurity.
- Supporting small business through grants, loans and counseling programs.

Serving the disproportionately impacted communities

- Addressing health disparities and the social determinants of health through community health workers, benefit navigators.
- Investments in housing and neighborhoods through assistance to those experiencing *homelessness, housing affordability programs and housing navigation assistance additional resources to high-poverty districts.*

Investing in infrastructures by making necessary investments to improve access to clean drinking water, support vital wastewater and stormwater infrastructure, and to expand access to broadband internet.

Replacing lost public sector revenue to provide government services to the extent of the reduction in revenue experienced due to the pandemic.

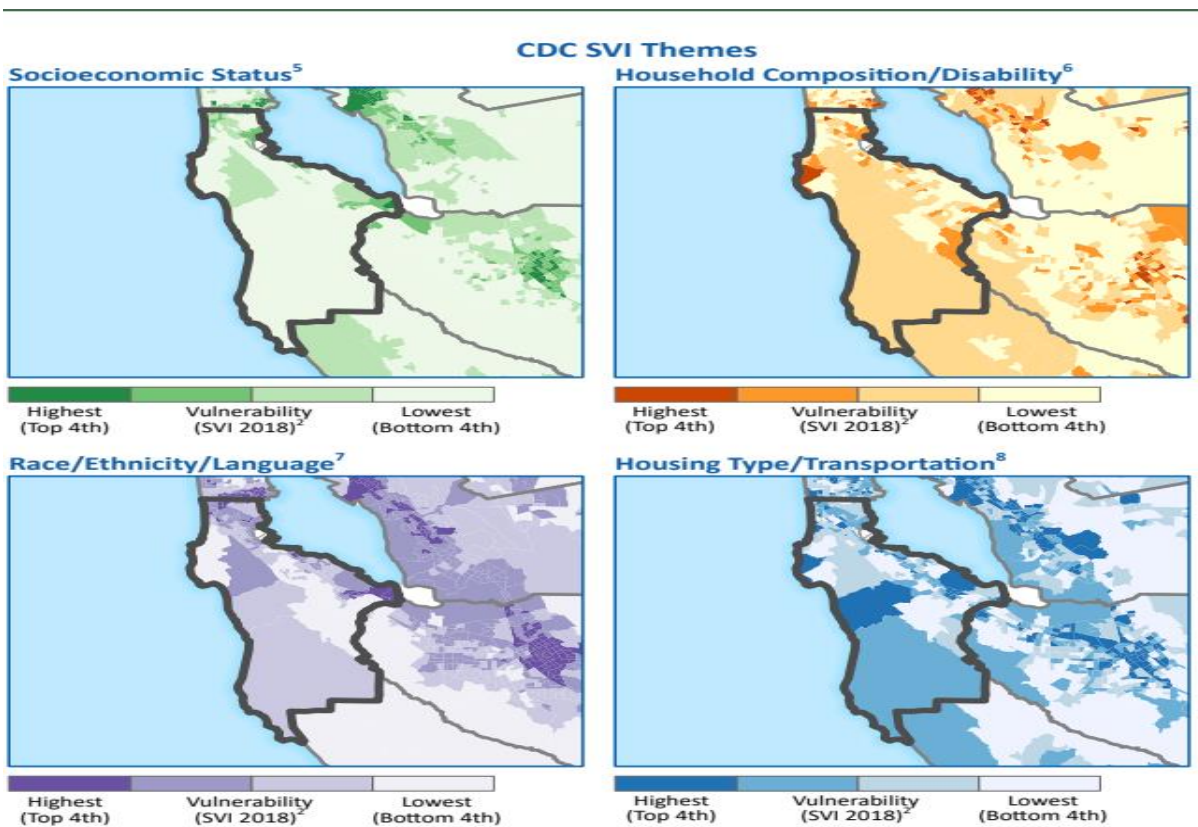
Emergency Rental Assistance Program (ERA 1):

San Mateo County was awarded \$ 22,791,546 in Federal Emergency Rental Assistance (ERA) Funds established by section 501 of the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2021. These funds are to provide financial assistance and housing stability services to eligible households. The County redirected the funds to the State of California Housing and Community Development to administer the funds on the County's behalf.

Promoting equitable outcomes

San Mateo County programs will be designed to promote equitable outcomes, advancing racial equity and support for underserved communities and vulnerable populations, particularly those communities within social vulnerability tracts as described below.

Efforts to date include identifying socially vulnerable communities within San Mateo County as defined by the Center for Disease Control's Social Vulnerability Index (CDC SVI). The social vulnerability factors are based pm a number of factors, including poverty, lack of access to transportation, and crowded housing may weaken a community's ability to prevent human suffering and financial loss in a pandemic or disaster. CDC SVI uses U.S. Census data to determine the social vulnerability of every census tract. Census tracts are subdivisions of counties for which the Census collects statistical data. CDC SVI ranks each tract on 15 social factors, including poverty, lack of vehicle access, and crowded housing, and groups them into four related themes. Each tract receives a separate ranking for each of the four themes as well as an overall ranking. Below is San Mateo County 2018 SVI Map.



Community Engagement

San Mateo County will conduct various methods of community outreach through meetings with community partners and county residents, and leveraging other resources for impactful initiatives, investments and infrastructure improvements that will have long-term measurable and sustainable impact.

Labor Practices

San Mateo County will utilize strong labor standards to promote effective and efficient delivery of high-quality infrastructure projects, while also supporting the economic recovery through strong employment opportunities for workers.

Use of Evidence

San Mateo County will identify any evidence-based interventions and/or if any projects are being evaluated through rigorous program evaluations that are designed to build evidence.
