GENERAL OVERVIEW

Executive Summary

The primary foci of Stark County, Ohio's use of funds have been for infrastructure projects involving water and sewer systems owned by the county and for the provision of government services. Some of the infrastructure projects commenced in 2021, while others will continue for the duration of this program, completing before the statutory deadline of December 31, 2026. These funds will improve public health by providing the opportunity for access to clean, safe, reliable drinking water and sanitary sewer systems throughout our county. Some of the identified infrastructure projects had been previously cost prohibitive, but are now financially feasible, through the utilization of these federal funds.

Uses of Funds

Stark County, Ohio, identified numerous water and sewer system projects, across multiple city, village, and township areas of the county. The goal was to identify worthy projects across Stark County so that residents across the county had an equal chance to benefit from this investment. In addition, through the provision of government services, all residents of the county were able to receive some benefit from these federal funds.

Promoting equitable outcomes

A key component in water and sewer project selection is geographic diversity across Stark County. Even areas are well-served by municipalities, though partnerships with other local government units were considered, to maximize the use of resources and to ensure the broadest population is served. Some of the infrastructure projects that were previously cost prohibitive were due to the cost share that would have been placed on county residents, many of which were in low-to-moderate income areas. The use of these federal funds allowed for the cost share on county residents to be significantly reduced or totally eliminated.

Community Engagement

With the goal of improved public health through clean, safe, and reliable water and sewer systems, a good understanding of existing resources and short-comings was identified. Reliance on existing community organizations and local government partners is necessary to ensure the broadest reach and the greatest impact on those communities most in need.

Labor Practices

For all water and sewer infrastructure projects, Stark County will follow all appropriate federal, state, and local guidelines related to prevailing wage, minority contracting, and hiring requirements.
