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# **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), signed into law on March 11, 2021, established the State and Local Fiscal Recovery Fund (SLFRF). This fund assists state and local governments in addressing the impacts of the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. The State of Arizona was allocated approximately \$4.2 billion from SLFRF to respond to the negative public health and economic impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. The projects funded by this allocation serve residents, communities, businesses, and schools most impacted by COVID-19.

Projects that accomplished these priorities included, but were not limited to, investments in first responders, public health workers, public safety professionals, community health services, transitional housing, water treatment, employment training, small businesses, nonprofits, impacted industries, educators, schools, and the public sector. Arizona's coordinated and rapid response to the severe impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic and its aftermath has resulted in historic levels of state investments.

This annual performance report focuses on Arizona's use of SLFRF from July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025, and includes updates on previously reported projects as applicable. Please reference <u>ARPA SLFRF Recovery Plans</u> from previous years for additional details.

#### Arizona's Promise

In the wake of the pandemic's challenges, Arizona is turning recovery into resurgence where hard work and perseverance leads to a better life and a brighter future for individuals and families. SLFRF programs align with Governor Katie Hobbs' central promise for Arizona that everyday people can find opportunity, security, and freedom in the State. This approach signifies that our decision-making is informed by the needs of Arizona's communities, with input and collaboration from stakeholders, and through transparent, accountable processes that support and provide opportunities for all Arizonans.

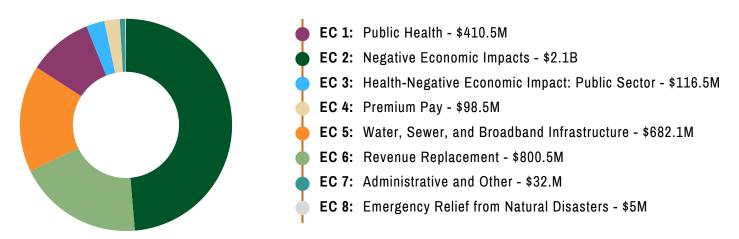
The State of Arizona stands firm in its commitment to a sustainable recovery, ensuring that the deployment of SLFRF funds is efficient and effective while also aligning with Governor Hobbs' vision for creating opportunity and building for the future. Through this concerted effort, Arizona has and will continue to navigate the post-pandemic landscape with innovative solutions that bolster public health and economic vitality for all its residents.

Arizona has prioritized SLFRF funds, in alignment with Governor Hobbs' vision for the "Arizona Promise" to create economic resilience, ensure safe communities, empower essential workers, improve housing resources, support quality education for all students and development for teachers, mitigate public health issues, support environmental sustainability, and update digital and physical infrastructure.

# **USE OF FUNDS**

The State of Arizona has strategically allocated its SLFRF award across eight expenditure categories (EC) to support a quick, sustainable, and equitable recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic and mitigate negative impacts. Arizona has obligated 100% of the \$4.2 billion in SLFRF awards to projects that support opportunities and security for all Arizonans. These funds have been provided to and used by various state agencies, nonprofits, businesses, households, schools, institutions of higher education, communities, and other local organizations serving the State.

# Expenditure Category 1: Public Health

Arizona has prioritized funds for public health mitigation efforts across the state. Major initiatives include resources and support for first responders and public health workers, health services, and community violence prevention.

#### Heal the Hero Foundation

First responders faced a mental health crisis due to the impact of COVID-19. Their roles changed in many ways and their stress levels increased. ARPA funds were used to provide innovative brain performance programs designed to improve stress reliance and performance for military and first responder communities.

#### Special Olympics Arizona, Inc.

The COVID-19 pandemic caused increased physical and mental health difficulties for Arizonans with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD). ARPA funds were used to expand the Healthy Leap program to provide services designed to increase physical activity, improve daily nutrition, heighten social engagement, and support better emotional wellbeing for residents with IDD.

# Expenditure Category 2: Negative Economic Impacts

The State of Arizona has invested significant pandemic relief funding resources to address the unprecedented negative economic, educational, and social impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic.

#### **Assistance to Households**

The COVID-19 pandemic impacted low-income communities, exacerbating food insecurity and the lack of affordable housing for these populations. The State has invested more than \$8 million in food assistance programs, \$38 million in child welfare and over \$245 million in housing assistance programs, including bridge and affordable housing services, emergency rental assistance, eviction prevention, and legal services to mitigate these issues. These housing initiatives will serve communities impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, including youth and seniors experiencing homelessness, persons with substance use disorders, justice-involved youth, and survivors of domestic violence and trafficking.

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#### Human Service Campus, Inc.

The COVID-19 pandemic contributed to a rise in homelessness in Arizona. Rent in Arizona has continued to increase while people struggle to recover from the economic hardship of the pandemic. ARPA funds were used to provide short and long term housing options to address the increased number of people who are unhoused and/or unsheltered in Arizona.

#### Workforce Assistance and Support for High-Demand Fields

The State of Arizona has invested significant SLFRF funding in projects that provide advanced skills and job training in order to address workforce shortages and increase demand in high-growth fields. For example, the State has invested funding for nurse training and placement, and infrastructure for semiconductor workforce growth and manufacturing. Additionally, funds were provided to organizations for workforce development, training, apprenticeships, and mentorship resources for students and adults entering high-demand fields. These organizations actively support Arizonans who are preparing to enter industries of the future and those who have previously experienced barriers to employment.



#### The Arizona Health Care Association (AHCA)

The healthcare industry was severely impacted by COVID-19. As Arizona's largest professional long term care association and advocacy organization, representing skilled nursing facilities and assisted living communities, AHCA used ARPA funds to recruit, train, and retain healthcare workers and grow the workforce to increase the ranks of the frontline workforce in Arizona.



#### **Education and Enrichment**

To address the negative educational impacts experienced by Arizonans of all ages and in line with the Governor's priority to improve educational outcomes across the State, Arizona has invested SLFRF funds to support and promote early childhood learning environments, K-12 students, and those pursuing higher education.

Upon taking office, Governor Hobbs announced three new competitive solicitations for educational investments to help ensure that schools, teachers, paraprofessionals, and students have the tools and resources they need to be successful.

#### **Support for Schools**

This grant program was designed to provide funding to more than 168 Arizona school districts and charter schools to address the negative educational disparities that are a direct result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

#### Summer Enrichment

This grant program provided funding for Arizona schools, nonprofits, and higher education institutions for summer 2023 enrichment programming to aid in the mitigation of negative impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on students' academic success.

#### **Educational Disparities and Teacher Development**

This grant program addressed COVID-19 learning loss arising from educational disparities, inclusive of academic services and programs provided to the Kindergarten through Grade 12 population. The grant also provided funding for teacher and paraprofessional professional development programming.

#### **Assistance to Nonprofits**

The State of Arizona has provided nearly \$29 million in SLFRF funds to nonprofits to support the critical role they provide in enriching communities and providing direct client services. These funds helped economically devastated nonprofits meet increased demand for services, remain open despite losing their typical sources of revenue, and ensure their workers remained employed.

SLFRF fund recipients provided a wide range of services, including services for veterans, the homeless, and domestic violence victims. They also provide support to pregnant women and families with young children, children and young adults in foster care, and provide after school programs. In addition to directly serving individuals, they also strengthen communities through arts and cultural programs.

#### The Arizona Pet Project

The pandemic hit Arizona's economy hard. Thousands of residents experienced housing insecurity and homelessness due to pandemic-related rent increases and rising inflation. In Arizona, approximately 70% of households have animals but most human and social delivery systems don't include pets in the care plan. ARPA funding was used to provide boarding, veterinary care, petdeposits, transportation, and referrals to unhoused populations, veterans, and seniors, preventing the unnecessary surrender of pets and reducing the number of dogs and cats in Arizona shelters.

#### **Strong Healthy Communities**

The State of Arizona has invested over \$68 million in projects that improve state and local parks, trails, neighborhood features, and outdoor spaces in order to promote healthy and safe communities. These projects have created jobs in Tribal and rural communities, revitalized public spaces, created lasting outdoor spaces for communities, and ensured that Arizonans had access to safe, open-air environments to improve health.

#### City of Bisbee

The COVID-19 pandemic had a significant economic impact on the rural community of Bisbee including the permanent closure of businesses that provided employment and tourism revenue. ARPA funds are being used to revitalize Bisbee's historical Camp Naco, which will increase employment, retail, and tourism opportunities for local residents.



# Expenditure Category 3: Public Health/Negative Economic Impact: Public Sector Capacity

The State of Arizona has invested SLFRF funding in critical upgrades of State government capacity and first responders. Major initiatives include upgrading the State's 9-1-1 infrastructure to improve public safety, reduce outages, and improve response timeframes and providing funding to local fire districts to help defray the costs associated with their response to the pandemic.

Arizona experienced significant backlogs created by the COVID-19 public health emergency on the State's and municipalities' court systems. SLFRF funds were invested to implement COVID-19 safety measures to facilitate court operations, upgrade courts' technology to facilitate virtual hearings, and enable document organization to improve case resolution timeliness.



#### Arizona Administrative Office of the Courts

During the COVID-19 public health emergency, case backlogs developed creating a hazardous environment in our justice system. ARPA funds were used to eliminate the backlog and ensure the state has adequate technological capacity to handle similar situations in the future.



Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Vernon Fire District experienced an increase in the number of calls related to domestic violence, child abuse, substance abuse, dual diagnosis, and COVID-19 related deaths. ARPA funds were used to support the Vernon Fire District in their efforts to meet the increased public need from the COVID-19 pandemic.

# Expenditure Category 4: Premium Pay

To stabilize turnover and vacancy rates across the State, both within government and externally, the State invested over \$98 million in premium pay for essential employees. This funding helped to ensure critical government services continued to be performed and delivered.

# Expenditure Category 5: Water, Sewer, and Broadband Infrastructure

The State of Arizona has made strategic investments to promote stewardship of its natural resources and to expand and improve infrastructure. In response to the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, the State has adopted more sustainable practices that foster growth, environmental resilience, and economic activity.

#### **Water and Sewer**

In partnership with Arizona's Departments of Water Resources and Environmental Quality, universities, local and Tribal government, and the Water Infrastructure Finance Authority, the State has undertaken water and sewer projects using SLFRF funds totaling approximately \$534 million to date. These projects include investments to improve access to and protect clean drinking water, upgrade wastewater infrastructure, strengthen conservation efforts, advance research, and construct drought and groundwater-resilient infrastructure. By making these critical investments, Governor Hobbs is enhancing the state's capacity to plan for and address water challenges.

#### **Local First Arizona Foundation**

A lack of access to reliable water resources, clean drinking water, and basic sanitation left many tribal, rural, and remote communities in Arizona more vulnerable to COVID-19. ARPA funding was used to support The Rural Renewable Drinking Water Program, a partnership with Local First Foundation Arizona and Source Global. This program equipped homes, schools, and community centers in rural and remote water-stressed areas of Arizona, including tribal lands, with a renewable water supply.



#### **Broadband Infrastructure**

Broadband expansion advances several priorities for Arizonans. Importantly, it bridges the digital divide between rural, tribal, and urban Arizona; and promotes digital equity, providing communities with essential digital access. Moreover, it addresses affordability, whereby broadband infrastructure expansion ensures quality, accessible, and affordable internet services for all. To this end, the State of Arizona has invested nearly \$148 million in SLFRF funds for broadband infrastructure projects.



#### The Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT)

The COVID-19 pandemic significantly highlighted and exacerbated the existing broadband infrastructure deficiencies in Arizona, particularly impacting rural, underserved, and tribal communities. ARPA funds were used to support extension of middle mile infrastructure through the Broadband Corridor Initiative, which expands high-speed internet access in rural areas of the state by connecting local providers to major internet hubs using fiber-optic conduit.

## Expenditure Category 6: Revenue Replacement

The State of Arizona is utilizing \$800M in revenue replacement funds to support government services that were negatively impacted by the pandemic. These funds have been used to address operational and fiscal concerns from the pandemic including maintaining adequate staffing levels, coordinating of essential government services, and other State costs related to COVID response and recovery efforts.

# Expenditure Category 8: Emergency Relief from Natural Disasters

The Arizona Department of Forestry and Fire management will provide grants to fire districts to help purchase capital equipment necessary to respond to public safety emergencies caused by natural disasters. This project will improve wildland fire response and suppression to reduce the negative economic impacts and protect the health and safety of the public.



# **COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT**

Arizona continues to leverage SLFRF support to bolster economic resilience by targeting investments in all communities affected by the pandemic. Governor Hobbs and state agencies maintain close communication with stakeholders, community leaders, local and Tribal government entities, and business partners to facilitate effective collaboration and implementation of SLFRF funds. Statewide tours, activities, meet and greets, roundtables, kitchen table discussions, and interviews have allowed the Governor's Office to see the impact of ARPA funds. The variety of engagement provides opportunities to receive and respond to feedback from communities across Arizona ensuring funds are used to fulfil Arizona's Promise by creating opportunity and building for the future.

Through roundtable discussions of both universities and community colleges, multiple apprenticeship programs and educational career paths have been created. Future 48 Workforce Accelerators are a cornerstone of Governor Hobbs' efforts to expand career pathways for Arizonans. Chandler-Gilbert Community College has focused on preparing students for jobs in the aerospace and defense industry while the Arizona Commerce Authority has begun the process of connecting all three public Arizona universities to facilitate and grow the expanding semiconductor workforce as well as an apprenticeship program.

BuildItAZ supports registered apprenticeship programs in creating hands-on learning experiences that provide a structured, industry-driven pathway to gain skills through paid on-the-job training and technical instruction, leading to a nationally recognized credential and lasting careers in the trades. This program specifically works with different construction groups as well as the Arizona Chapter Associated General Contractors of America, Inc. to help members of the community connect with programs best suited to further their careers in the tradeskill fields.



Owning a home offers freedom and independence while building a strong financial foundation. Arizona's Promise includes creating more opportunities for residents to find and purchase homes, with support as needed, in the communities they love and want to live in. The Arizona is Home program was established to provide Arizonans an opportunity to purchase their first homes amidst a housing shortage and rising rent prices due to the effects of COVID-19.

While visiting different communities in Arizona, Governor Hobbs met with a resident of Flagstaff that was previously living out of his car and purchased his first house after the implementation of the program with the Arizona Department of Housing. She also assisted a Tucson resident moving into her new home. "Maria is a widow and hardworking mom of four kids. As a medication technician, she helps keep our seniors healthy. After renting for eight years, Maria was finally able to buy a home thanks to down payment assistance from our Arizona Is Home program." Governor Hobbs reflected on the occasion.

SLFRF funds have also been utilized to help Arizonans that require safe environments and support to get back on their feet to find and/or maintain long term housing. Community members like Michelle Jameson with the U.S. Vets Phoenix program said these supports like, "Housing, food and safety should never be considered luxuries," and should be accessible to all Arizonans.

The Arizona Department of Housing (ADOH) contracted with service providers that have been proven to be successful. Community Bridge's two COVID hotels in Mesa were open for 12 months and served 672 high risk homeless from street outreach and Police referrals. Average length of stay was 66 days and about 50% successfully exited to permanent housing.

Similarly, CASS Haven Shelter, an emergency shelter supporting seniors experiencing homelessness, provides a welcoming environment designed to feel like a residential community. With amenities including private bedrooms and bathrooms and a communal kitchenette, residents are able to receive specific, required care in a humane and supportive space.

Arizona is also working with both state and local agencies to prepare and support grantees in their efforts to ensure programs vital to Arizona communities continue to operate post ARPA awards. Quarterly Communities of Practice hosted by the Governor's Office, provide sessions with topics focused on fiscal actions, best grant practices, and an opportunity for grantees to apply session content to their grant systems through networking and discussion.

As the needs of Arizona residents evolve, the Governor's office is committed to reflecting those needs in the use of the obligated funds and programs created to help support them. Governor Hobbs will continue to focus on building relationships to connect citizens with ARPA funded services and ensure feedback from the community is effectively translated into successful outreach and continued support. These efforts are expected to go beyond the life of the ARPA funds and continue the growth for the citizens in our state.

# **LABOR PRACTICES**

The infrastructure projects funded by the State of Arizona are operated under a strict set of labor practices. These projects are monitored, in part, by the Labor Compliance team within the Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT). This team monitors and investigates contractors engaged in construction projects to ensure compliance with Davis-Bacon and related Acts. The State of Arizona promotes effective and efficient delivery of all infrastructure projects in compliance with all relevant rules and regulations.

# **USE OF EVIDENCE**

Highlighting evidence-based programs closely follows the priority areas and expenditure categories identified by Governor Hobbs and the U.S. Treasury, respectively. The State of Arizona has included the Use of Evidence in the Project Inventory section. The State ensures projects follow sound evidence-based intervention principles and are reasonably justified. The State of Arizona has encouraged competitive applicants for SLFRF projects to consider and utilize evidence-informed strategies.

As reflected in the Project Inventory, based on current reports from grantees, 83 projects contain elements of evidence-based programming. Additionally, the State of Arizona has highlighted certain programs dedicated to program evaluation and funding for Institutional Review Board (IRB) studies. IRB studies lead to further evidence the State uses to inform future grants.



# PERFORMANCE REPORT

Arizona continuously monitors fiscal and programmatic performance measures to ensure SLFRF funds are used to mitigate the impacts from the COVID-19 pandemic to support a quick, sustainable, and equitable recovery. Grantees and subrecipients have collected and reported data for their Key Performance Indicators. Metrics include individuals served and demographic data for projects and subrecipients reported through June 30, 2024.

The report illustrates the continued response and positive impacts undertaken by Arizona to help communities recover from the negative impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. Qualitative data was collected from grantees and subrecipients to help tell the story of the promise to create an Arizona where everyone has the opportunity to succeed.

The Project Inventory, located in the next section of this document, provides more specific information on each of the projects that have been executed in the following areas: Period of Performance, Project Overview, Major Activities, Goals, and Key Performance Indicators.

#### The Arizona Promise

The stories in the report represent just a few of many SFLRF funded projects and programs that support the restoration of the Arizona Promise by expanding opportunity, security, and freedom for people across the state. These projects highlight Governor Hobbs' policy priorities and efforts to lower the cost of housing, grow a thriving economy, keep Arizona families safe, secure Arizona's water future, and enhance Arizona's infrastructure. Selected projects also highlight expenditure code data through housing, economic, and education accomplishments.

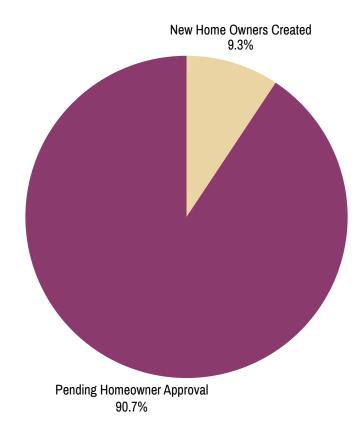

# A PATHWAY TO HOME OWNERSHIP FOR FIRST-TIME HOME BUYERS THROUGH "ARIZONA IS HOME" INITIATIVE

The 'Arizona is Home' initiative is a collaborative effort between the Arizona Department of Housing (ADOH) and the Arizona Industrial Development Authority (AZIDA) to support first-time homebuyers across the state. Through this program, ADOH has awarded grants to Chicanos Por La Causa (CPLC) and Trellis to offer enhanced down payment assistance and mortgage interest rate relief to low- and moderate-income buyers, including those in Maricopa and Pima Counties. In addition, AZIDA has developed a new loan product aimed at first-time homebuyers in rural counties, providing both down payment assistance and interest rate reductions.

ARPA funding supports CPLC's program goals by increasing down payment and closing costs assistance for eligible first-time homebuyers. This greatly reduces a primary barrier to homeownership. A crucial impact of ARPA funding has been the ability to expand income eligibility to serve a wider demographic. Previously, the program focused on individuals and families at or below 80% of the Area Median Income (AMI). The ARPA program allowed CPLC to assist those with incomes between 81% and 120% AMI. This expansion is vital in addressing the "missing middle" in housing affordability, reaching more working families who struggle to afford homes.

By directly addressing the high costs of down payments and closing costs, ARPA has empowered more Arizonans to achieve homeownership, especially in a highly competitive housing market. This boost in homeownership opportunities directly aligns with the program's objective of increasing homeownership rates across the state.



One significant milestone for this grant that our organization is particularly proud of is successfully helping middle-class families close on new homes using the Arizona is Home mortgage assistance program.

This achievement directly fulfills the program's expanded goal of making homeownership a reality for middle-class families across the state. To ensure the long-term success and sustainability of homeownership achieved through the program, our organization has implemented a robust Homebuyer Post-Purchase Counseling initiative.

Requiring and providing access to this education ensures that new homeowners are well-prepared for the responsibilities of homeownership, thereby reducing the risk of default and promoting long-term financial stability. This counseling covers key topics including financial management, home maintenance and safety, property planning, and strategies to address housing-related challenges to help homeowners sustain long-term stability and security.

CPLC's ARPA-funded Arizona is Home program has had a significant positive impact on communities across Arizona. Its most direct outcome has been increasing homeownership among low- and moderate-income individuals and families, helping to foster long-term stability and build generational wealth.

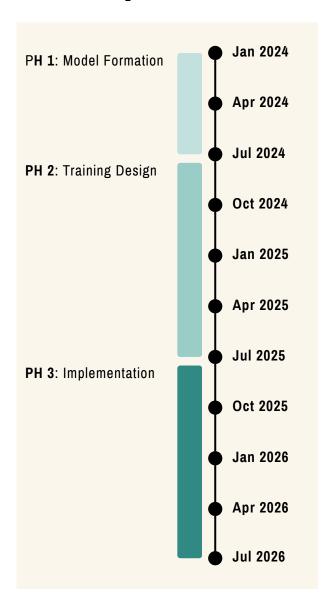

# WORKFORCE TASKFORCE STRENGTHENS REGIONAL CAPACITY AND ECONOMIC GROWTH

Local First Arizona Foundation is a non-profit that strives to create a thriving, inclusive and lasting Arizona economy by supporting local small businesses, fostering entrepreneurship, increasing access to capital to community members, and educating consumers about the profound impact of their spending choices on the local economy. ARPA funding made possible a five-county, rural workforce development collaboration of four community colleges, various local governments and community-based organizations via the Northern Arizona Good Jobs Network.



Launched in 2023, this robust program is implementing new training-to-employment models based on rural employers' needs to hire and upskill qualified workers in four focus sectors: manufacturing, construction, healthcare and social assistance, and retail and hospitality. The program also includes onsite coaching from employers on the Good Jobs Principles framework.

The first phase of this project formed the network and model for ongoing regional collaboration and culminated in a blueprint document to guide design and implementation phases. The second phase focused on design of various training models and collection of additional employer input. During Phase 2, Local First Arizona secured a private foundation's funding for three colleges in support of their training implementation, demonstrating that solid, employer-driven plans and regional collaboration are valued and can attract additional investment.

The final, third phase is implementation of these training programs from mid-2025 through mid-2026. A body of metrics will help evaluate success. These metrics include training completions, hires from training programs, and upskilling that results in promotions or wage increases.

Throughout implementation, which we are just starting, we will work to share learnings and outcomes as real-time as possible both with the governmental workforce system as well as private sector philanthropists and investors.



The main goal is for employers to see the value of the training programs built on their input and of being a Good Jobs employer in practice. This way, industry in the four focus sectors becomes a primary source for sustaining necessary funding to scale programs up or continue to develop and evolve them in line with employers' needs.

Our process to date has fostered stronger regional collaboration between institutions of higher education, local governments at the municipal and county levels, nonprofits that serve as intermediaries and providers of technical assistance, and the existing workforce development system, including ARIZONA@WORK divisions across a five-county area. The overall impact of this funding will catalyze, augment, and work alongside additional investments from the public and private sectors to expand reach of services in rural areas of our state, with a focus on the skills needs of rural employers.

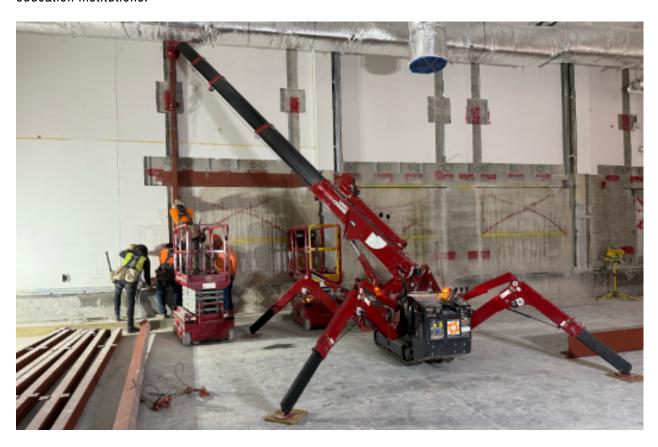

# RAPID DEVELOPMENTS IN ARIZONA'S SEMICONDUCTOR INDUSTRY

The Arizona Commerce Authority has received ARPA funds to enable and support the provision of workforce development and training for the semiconductor industry in partnership with various higher education institutions.



#### University of Arizona Micro/Nano Fabrication Center Semiconductor Project

ARPA funding is enabling the University of Arizona (U of A) to expand and update our main cleanroom to state-of-the art specifications, develop a digital learning platform with digital twins of semiconductor processing labs, and create an augmented reality classroom.

Additional funds are also being used to expand the semiconductor manufacturing teaching capabilities of our community college partner, Pima Community College. All of these improvements will help the U of A and its partners expand workforce training throughout the state, especially in Southern Arizona.

A broad spectrum of students will benefit from cutting-edge semiconductor manufacturing training. Community college students will be able to obtain certifications and associate's degrees that specialize in semiconductor manufacturing operations and will be able to transfer to four-year universities if desired.

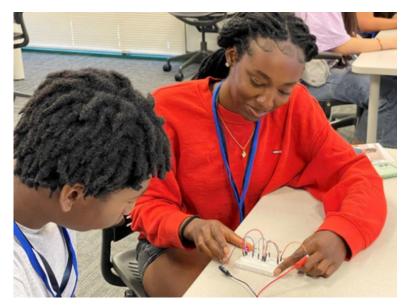
Undergraduate students will likewise be able to obtain certification, bachelor's degrees, and advanced training in semiconductor manufacturing, as well as participate in related research. Graduate students will be able to utilize state-of-the-art research facilities. Distance learners will be able to access the digital platforms and obtain certifications and degrees. Industry will benefit from both a trained workforce as well as access to faculty expertise and research facilities.

These resources will accelerate and expand semiconductor workforce training, R&D, knowledge and technology transfer, as well as industry and job growth across the state.

#### Process Technician Apprenticeship Program for TSMC Arizona Foundation

ARPA supports the educational equipment and materials procured for the TSMC Arizona Foundation Process Technician Apprenticeship Program (PTAP). This specialized training program is a collaboration between TSMC, Northern Arizona University, Rio Salado Community College and launches this Fall at NAU's North Valley Campus.

TSMC marketed these educational trainings in the Phoenix metro area and collectively received 700 applications for all their apprenticeship programs.



Fifty candidates were interviewed for the PTAP role and as the cohort's progress, classes are expected to expand.

This specialized training leads to new skills, experience with semiconductor-related equipment, higher earning jobs and graduates receive credits/credit equivalents that can be applied to AAS and BS degrees. The PTAP helps to provide better economic and career opportunities for the community.

#### **Arizona State University**

Arizona State University (ASU) has cultivated partnerships within the semiconductor ecosystem in Arizona that leverage the capabilities of partners to advance the research and development of new technologies and grow the semiconductor workforce in Arizona. ARPA funding is being used to enhance ASU's fan-out wafer-level packaging R&D, expand gallium nitride (GaN) research, and support technologies like 6G, IoT, and machine learning. It will also fund workforce development initiatives to train technology leaders of the future through internship programs, collaborative research, and lab-to-fab experiences with NXP semiconductors.

#### SUPPORT FOR WORKING FAMILIES

Bright Futures AZ aims to primarily serve working families by making child care more affordable and accessible. Providing families access to child care not only improves children's development and wellbeing, but is foundational to a thriving economy. Disruptions in child care, a significant burden for many Arizonans, exacerbated by the pandemic, cause an economic disruption to Arizona's families, employers, and state economy.

ARPA funding is being used to enhance a parent website to add information to help parents find available care, including availability, quality status, and cost of care. Funds are also being used to provide Early Childhood Educator Child Care Scholarships. The scholarship is available for early childhood educators who serve children birth to age 5 with disabilities. Participating educators will be able to continue leading their classrooms, while having their children in nurturing child care environments.

# Affordable and Thriving Economy

#### **Protecting First Responders**

Heal the Hero is a non-profit dedicated to transforming mental health services for first responders, veterans, and other heroes across the country. Mental health resilience is a critical priority. Heal the Hero collaborates with leaders across government, military, and public service agencies to invest in the wellbeing of first responders and veterans creating healthier, safer communities.

ARPA funding has been a force multiplier for Heal the Hero Foundation. The funding has allowed the foundation to provide this highly effective brain performance program to first responders across Arizona. COVID-19 had a profound impact on all of us, but no segment of our population has been more heavily affected than our first responders. The first responder community highly values the benefits of improved sleep, reduced stress, and increased resilience that the program provides. ARPA funding has made the six month, 84-session program available for approximately 5,000 Arizona first responders statewide since program inception.



We measure success based on analytics designed to capture program impact. In addition to this, the responses we receive from first responders relating their program experience are very gratifying. Program to date improvements include:

- 68% improvement in sleep
- 52.44% reduction in anxiety
- 49.44% reduction in depression
- 56.67% reduction in trauma
- 12.74% improvement in overall quality of life

The program helps the individual first responder improve their quality of life. The program's impact extends far beyond, affecting not only family, friends, and colleagues but also the broader community. We frequently receive feedback from family members and coworkers who comment on the improvement they observe in those participating in the program. The program's impact is reflected in first responders being more present when they are home, as they transition more effectively from their on-duty life to their personal life. Another benefit of the program is improved decision-making as executive function improves. It has been proven that our communities are safer when first responders make better decisions.

There are many achievements we are proud of, beginning with offering the program to all Arizona first responders via a network of 86 neuro terminals. The remote program delivery is an incredible achievement.

We have first responders from more than 100 agencies participating in the program thus becoming an integral component of agencies' peer support and wellness offerings.

The ARPA-funded program has increased the visibility of the Heal the Hero Foundation, enabling us to engage in conversations with potential collaborators. We are currently updating our website to more effectively tell the story of the program's significant impact on the lives of first responders.

# Water Resilience & Broadband Infrastructure

# BROADBAND INTERNET EXPANDS ACCESS IN RURAL PARTS OF ARIZONA

This Broadband Projects initiative works to develop critical infrastructure needed to increase access to internet services for Arizonans across rural and urban areas and expand the state's digital landscape. ARPA funding has allowed the construction of 400 miles of new middle-mile conduit. The new middle-mile conduit along I-17 (Phoenix to Flagstaff) was never feasible for a telecommunications company due to the challenges and cost of construction along 140 miles of very rocky and hilly terrain. Now that it is built, the state is well mentioned to receive lease requests of the conduit and fiber which are directly tied to underserved and unserved communities.

#### PROTECTION FOR TUCSON'S DRINKING WATER SUPPLY

The Arizona Department of Environmental Quality (ADEQ) monitors scientific, regulatory and legal developments related to PFAS. ADEQ has developed a carefully considered approach to address PFAS in Arizona that includes ongoing discussions and collaboration with federal, state and local agency partners.

The City of Tucson has taken proactive action to combat PFAS contamination in local groundwater to protect public health. Tucson's groundwater is a designated sole source aquifer, meaning that the city does not have immediate access to surface water from lakes, streams, or rivers. This makes PFAS contamination a critical issue for residents, especially as drought impacts the region. Additionally, PFAS contamination disproportionately impacts historically disinvested communities. The funding from ARPA supports Tucson's proactive approach.



The \$25 million in ARPA funding administered through ADEQ to the city has been critical in accelerating the design and construction of a PFAS pretreatment facility at Tucson Airport Remediation Project Advanced Oxidation Process Water Treatment Facility (TARP AOP). The TARP AOP facility is a Superfund site designed and operated to remediate trichloroethylene (TCE) and 1,4-dioxane. This project will allow the TARP AOP to return to its originally intended purpose of remediating TCE and 1,4-dioxane while also removing PFAS from the treated water. The funding eliminated financial barriers that would have prevented Tucson from constructing the facility, ensuring faster protection of our water supply and compliance with emerging federal regulations.

An anticipated milestone, once construction is complete, will be the ability to operate the TARP AOP at its full design capacity. Prior to seeing increased concentrations of PFAS in influent and incurring the costs of numerous granular activated carbon change outs, great progress was made in remediating the existing plume of TCE. Because the existing treatment facility was not designed to treat PFAS, TARP AOP has been operating at a reduced flow rate to ensure removal of PFAS, slowing the remediation of groundwater contamination. The pretreatment facility will remove PFAS prior to entering the existing treatment facility where TCE, 1,4-dioxane and other volatile organic compounds (VOCs) can be removed.

As one of the most heavily impacted communities in the country by PFAS contamination, Tucson continues to maximize use of its water resources in alignment with ADEQ's One Water 2100 Plan while ensuring our customers receive high-quality and reliable drinking water. The TARP AOP protects potable water supplies and meets non-potable demands, by allowing treated water to be reused for irrigation, industrial, and other non-potable purposes.
