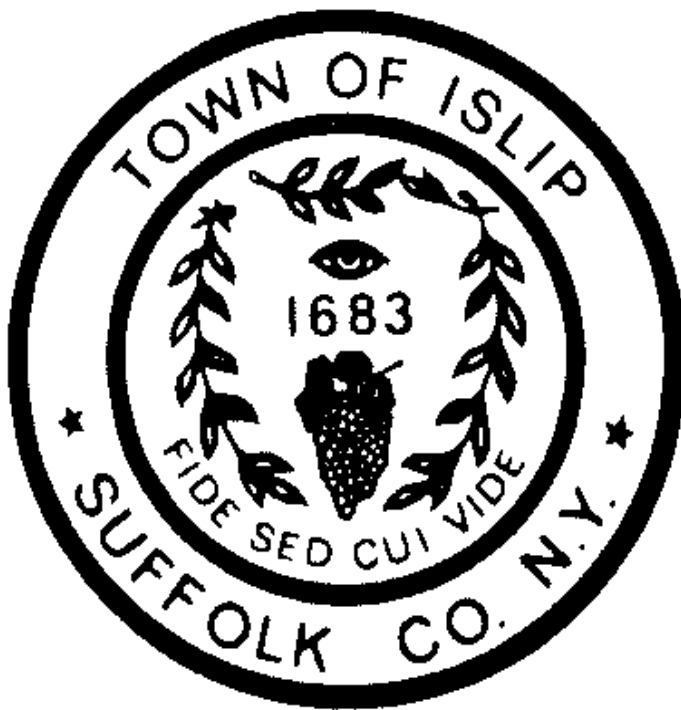

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GENERAL OVERVIEW

Executive Summary

On May 10, 2021, the U.S. Department of the Treasury announced the launch of the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF), or Fiscal Recovery Funds, established by the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA) to provide \$350 billion in emergency funding for eligible state, local, territorial, and Tribal governments. The focus of the SLFRF is to fight the pandemic and support businesses struggling with its public health and economic impacts, maintain vital public services, and build an equitable recovery by supporting long-term growth and opportunity in communities.

The SLFRF delivers \$47,551,642 to the Town of Islip (Town), in two tranches, one year apart, of \$23,775,821 each, to support the immediate pandemic response, bring back jobs and lay the groundwork for a strong and equitable recovery. The funding has been obligated by December 31, 2024, and expended by December 31, 2026.

The Department of Treasury adopted an interim Final Rule in May of 2021 and the Final Rule on January 6, 2022 to implement eligible use categories and other restrictions on the use of funds under the SLFRF program. The Final Rule took effect on April 1, 2022 and the interim final rule remained in effect until that time. The Final Rule is used as a guideline for state and local governments on how funding should be managed and distributed. The Treasury's Final Rule details the Town's compliance responsibilities and provides additional information on eligible and restricted uses of SLFRF award funds and reporting requirements.

The Town received its first \$23,775,821 allocation on August 18, 2021, and its second allocation on September 6, 2022. This resource will continue to help the Town meet pandemic response needs and rebuild a stronger and more equitable economy. The Town of Islip Board has adopted twenty-six specific projects and budgets to be funded by the SLFRF totaling \$47,551,642, all of which has been obligated and \$24,679,414 has been spent on actual expenditures.

Uses of Funds

SLFRF provide the eligible state, local, territorial, and Tribal governments with a substantial infusion of resources to meet pandemic response needs and rebuild a stronger, more equitable economy as the county recovers. Within the categories of eligible uses, recipients have broad flexibility to decide how best to use this funding to meet the needs of their communities.

The Islip Town Board considered the following expenditure categories as part of the first and second allocations of \$47,551,642:

- a. *Public Health (EC 1)* - The Town has not allocated any ARPA Fiscal Recovery Funds to this category of the SLFRF.
- b. *Negative Economic Impacts (EC 2)* – Pursuant to the Final Rule, Fiscal Recovery Funds may be used to assist households or populations, preferably those most disproportionately impacted, by the negative economic impacts of the COVID-19 public health emergency. Small businesses and non-profits throughout the Town of Islip faced severe challenges due to the pandemic resulting from shutdowns, decrease in revenue, and increased costs. Fiscal Recovery Funds will be allocated to address negative economic impacts in these sectors. To support businesses in weathering the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Town continues to provide assistance targeted specifically to small businesses and non-profits impacted by the pandemic. The Town has established a Keep Islip Thriving (KIT) Grant and allocated \$6,000,000 to eligible businesses and organizations as part of the Town’s rebuilding effort. The Town’s ARPA COVID Relief Task Force has established program guidelines for funding and marketing this opportunity through mailings, area chambers of commerce, and community groups. The Town has invested in disproportionately impacted communities by improving sidewalks to promote healthier living and address pedestrian and driver safety.
- c. *Public Health-Negative Economic Impact: Public Sector Capacity (EC 3)* - The Town has not allocated any ARPA Fiscal Recovery Funds to this category of the SLFRF.
- d. *Premium Pay (EC 4)* – Premium pay may be provided retroactively for work performed at any time since January 27, 2020. To respond to workers performing essential work during the COVID-19 public health emergency, Town has allocated \$349,303 of SLFRF funding to provide a premium payment to essential eligible workers that are key to efforts to recover from the pandemic and serving Town residents. Town’s ARPA COVID Relief Task Force has defined criteria to assist in identifying eligible workers who fall within the Final Rule’s definition of “essential worker.”
- e. *Water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure (EC 5)* – The Town has town-wide drainage projects and Lexington Village Sewer District project under the Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF) guidelines and allocated \$9,225,000 and \$700,000, of ARPA funds respectively. The town-wide drainage project includes the upgrade, repair or replacement/construction of traditional pipe, storage and treatment systems and storm drain inlet protection on various roads throughout the Town and the purchase of heavy vehicles. The Lexington Village Sewer District project involves the replacement of its failing on-site sewage treatment plant. In 2024, the Town has approved and funded two additional projects under this the category: 1) The East Islip Marina project was allocated \$2,000,000 and will connect the land based pump out station, harbor patrol building, the restaurant and the hatchery to a sewer line; 2) In conjunction with a \$10 million New York State grant awarded to the Islip Regional Shellfish Hatchery, the project has been allocated \$5 million in ARPA funds to support the construction of a new, state-of-the-art facility. This new facility will be instrumental in growing shellfish for environmental water restoration and providing juvenile shellfish, or seed, to New York shellfish farmers for their aquaculture operations. This project is designed to address critical environmental challenges, enhance sustainable development, and promote resiliency in coastal ecosystems.

- f. *Revenue Replacement (EC 6)* - The Town has calculated its Revenue Loss to be approximately \$22 million between fiscal years 2019 and 2020, based upon the Town's 2019 and 2020 Audited Financial Statements.¹ Sections 602(c)(1)(C) and 603(c)(1)(C) of the American Rescue Plan Act provide recipients with broad latitude to use the Fiscal Recovery Funds for provisions of government service, as defined under the Census Bureau's concept of "General Revenue from Own Sources" in the Annual Survey of State and Local Government Finances. Government services can include, but are not limited to, maintenance or pay-go funded building of infrastructure including roads; modernization of cybersecurity (including hardware, software, and protection to critical infrastructure); health services; environmental remediation; school or educational services; and the provision of police; fire and other public safety services.

Town's allocation of \$22,170,087 SLFRF funding towards town-wide park repairs and/or improvements. The Town of Islip, like many other governments, witnessed a significant increase in park usage during the COVID-19 pandemic. Investments in Town parks, public beaches and other outdoor recreation spaces will promote healthier living environments and outdoor recreation and socialization to mitigate the spread of COVID-19. Furthermore, improvements and construction of existing facilities at Town Hall to ensure they would be readily accessible to, and serviceable by individuals with disabilities and compliant with ADA regulations.

- g. *Emergency Relief from Natural Disasters (EC 8)* - The Town has not allocated any ARPA Fiscal Recovery Funds to this category of the SLFRF.
- h. *Surface Transportation (EC 9)* - The Town has not allocated any ARPA Fiscal Recovery Funds to this category of the SLFRF.
- i. *Title 1 (EC 10)* - The Town has not allocated any ARPA Fiscal Recovery Funds to this category of the SLFRF

Promoting equitable outcomes

The Town has completed its assessment of the impact of the COVID-19 public health emergency and is actively utilizing Fiscal Recovery Funds to advance its goal to promote equitable outcomes and direct action towards low to moderate income areas. The Town has implemented various projects that improve outdoor facilities (such as sidewalks, parks, turf fields, playground equipment, etc.) to support healthier living, outdoor recreation, and socialization to mitigate the spread of COVID-19, infrastructure improvements and small business and non-profit grant programs. The Town's SLFRF funded programs are designed with equity at the core, with targeted outreach and investments directed toward individuals and households residing in qualified census tracts and/or those experiencing long-standing disparities and structural barriers that negatively impact quality of life.

¹ The Town utilized the US Treasury's Template, and followed all guidance in the Final Rule and the Treasury's Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ's) as of April 27, 2022, including the Appendix regarding eligible Revenues to include and exclude in the calculation.

Community Engagement

Town of Islip has incorporated substantial community engagement into planning for the allocation of SLFRF funding. This community engagement includes public hearings, outreach through social media networks and targeted community mailings to Town of Islip residents.

All allocations of Fiscal Recovery Funds by the Town have been made pursuant to Town Board Resolution. All resolutions and public hearings are advertised on the Town website and public hearing notices are in local newspapers prior to the public meeting.

At Town Board Meetings, residents are afforded an opportunity to comment on matters before the Town Board during the public comment portion of the public meeting.

All Town Board Meetings are live streamed through the Town's website and accessible thereafter on the Town's YouTube platform. Furthermore, all Town Board meetings are broadcasted on a dedicated Government and Education cable television channel, with multiple viewing times.

Additionally, the Town and each Town Councilmember maintain active social media pages and routinely inform and engage with Town residents on a wide variety of town related issues. Town's social media extends to the following platforms: Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, and YouTube. In addition to social networking outreach, Town residents are encouraged to stay informed and up to date on important news, alerts and by signing up for our E-Alerts on the Town's website (<https://islipny.gov/notify-me>).

The Town has established four councilmatic districts within the Town for councilmembers to engage with their respective constituents. Each councilmember also has social media and routinely interact with residents on a wide variety of town related issues.

The Town tries to make all reasonable accommodations to assist citizens, such as alternative formats, sign language, translations, interpretators, closed captioning/subtitling, and review of accommodation requests outside of our ADA plan.

Labor Practices

Federal and State labor standards will be followed for all ARPA funds including ensuring that prevailing wages are paid, New York State WICKS Law followed, and Davis Bacon Wage standards are adopted. Additional required labor standards will be incorporated into each investment area as part of the planning process. Compliance with all required labor standards will be monitored by Town of Islip administration staff.

Use of Evidence

The Town of Islip did not implement projects under the evidence-based intervention categories outlined by the U.S. Treasury. While the Town's initiatives are aligned with community needs and priorities, they do not fall under the specific project types identified by the U.S. Department of the Treasury as requiring or recommending evidence-based implementation, such as early childhood education, home visiting programs, or school-based academic and behavioral supports.

Performance Report

The Town manages project performance using various oversight and control processes which are customized to the specific project or project type. As a general overview, once a project is adopted by the Town Board, an accountable Project Manager or Department Head is assigned who is responsible for ensuring the project adheres to all Town policies and procedures, as well as the U.S. Treasury Final Rule for use of American Rescue Plan Act monies. Oversight and monitoring are conducted by Town control functions, including the Supervisor's Office, the Comptroller's Office, and the Purchasing Department. In addition, most of the infrastructure projects have an internal or external Engineer assigned, who assists in the development of bid specifications, provides guidance in the evaluation of Bid and/or RFP responses, provides construction oversight and inspections of work, and reviews and certifies to the Town invoices for payment.

The Town has an established ARPA committee comprised of the Town Supervisor, Chief of Staff, Town Attorney, Assistant Town Attorney, Comptroller, Secretary to Comptroller, Economic Director, and Foreign Trade Zone Director. The committee met regularly to discuss new projects and the status and progression of previously board approved projects.

Project Expenditure Category: 2.9, Small Business Economic Assistance

Project Overview

- The KIT Grant Program will assist eligible candidates who demonstrate a negative financial impact due to COVID. This effort consists of a grant program designed to provide direct financial aid and outreach to support local businesses and nonprofit organizations with a focus on those in greatest need. Small businesses and nonprofits that qualify for the KIT Grant can receive upwards of \$10,000, with no re-payment required.

Funding amount: \$349,303

Project Expenditure Category: 4.1, Public Sector Employees

Project Overview

- To respond to workers performing essential work during the COVID-19 public health emergency by providing premium pay to eligible workers of the Town that are performing such essential work. Premium pay is designed compensate workers that, by virtue of their employment, were forced to take on additional burdens and make great personal sacrifices as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Project LR001: Casamento Zipline

Funding amount: \$125,419

Project Expenditure Category: 6.1, Revenue Replacement: Provision of Government Services

Project Overview

The Town has allocated funds for the investment in parks and public outdoor recreation spaces to promote healthier living environments and outdoor recreation and socialization to mitigate the spread of COVID-19. This project is to design and construct a zipline at Casamento Park in Bay Shore.

Funding amount: \$1,000,000

Project Overview

The Town has allocated funds for the investment in parks and public outdoor recreation spaces to promote healthier living environments and outdoor recreation and socialization to mitigate the spread of COVID-19. This project is to replace and update windows, air conditioning, floors, bleachers, bathrooms and paint at the Brentwood Recreation Center Gym.

Project LR003: Central Islip Community Park

Funding amount: \$499,581

Project Expenditure Category: 6.1, Revenue Replacement: Provision of Government Services

Project Overview

The Town has allocated funds for the investment in parks and public outdoor recreation spaces to promote healthier living environments and outdoor recreation and socialization to mitigate the spread of COVID-19. This project is for the installation of a pre-fabricated building for bathrooms and a concession stand at the Central Islip Community Park.

Project LR004: Eastview Field

Funding amount: \$1,451,546

Project Overview

The Town has allocated funds for the investment in parks and public outdoor recreation spaces to promote healthier living environments and outdoor recreation and socialization to mitigate the spread of COVID-19. This project is to install turf fields at Eastview.

Project LR006: Pickleball and Tennis Courts

Funding amount: \$361,779

Project Expenditure Category: 6.1, Revenue Replacement: Provision of Government Services

Project Overview

The Town has allocated funds for the investment in parks and public outdoor recreation spaces to promote healthier living environments and outdoor recreation and socialization to mitigate the spread of COVID-19. This project is to expand the footprint of courts already in use that will then accommodate three tennis courts and two pickleball courts in Holbrook.

Project LR007: Little League of the Islips

Funding amount: \$660,528

Project Expenditure Category: 6.1, Revenue Replacement: Provision of Government Services

Project Overview

The Town has allocated funds for the investment in parks and public outdoor recreation spaces to promote healthier living environments and outdoor recreation and socialization to mitigate the spread of COVID-19. This project is to install turf for three little league fields at Westbrook.

Project LR008: Sayville Marina Park

Funding amount: \$821,525

Project Expenditure Category: 6.1, Revenue Replacement: Provision of Government Services

Project Overview

The Town has allocated funds for the investment in parks and public outdoor recreation spaces to promote healthier living environments and outdoor recreation and socialization to mitigate the spread of COVID-19. This project is to replace playground equipment and new fence at Sayville Marina Park.

Project LR009: Broadway Avenue Park

Funding amount: \$1,307,428

Project Expenditure Category: 6.1, Revenue Replacement: Provision of Government Services

Project Overview

The Town has allocated funds for the investment in parks and public outdoor recreation spaces to promote healthier living environments and outdoor recreation and socialization to mitigate the spread of COVID-19. This project is to install a turf field for multipurpose use.

Project LR010: West Islip Little League

Funding amount: \$1,500,000

Project Expenditure Category: 6.1, Revenue Replacement: Provision of Government Services

Project Overview

The Town has allocated funds for the investment in parks and public outdoor recreation spaces to promote healthier living environments and outdoor recreation and socialization to mitigate the spread of COVID-19. This project is to install turf infields, improve fencing, dugouts and replace concession building at West Islip Little League.

Project LR011: 401 Main Street Park

Funding amount: \$1,646,924

Project Expenditure Category: 6.1, Revenue Replacement: Provision of Government Services

Project Overview

The Town has allocated funds for the investment in parks and public outdoor recreation spaces to promote healthier living environments and outdoor recreation and socialization to mitigate the spread of COVID-19. This project is to install turf for soccer fields at 401 Main Street.

Project LR013: Patrol Bikes

Funding amount: \$9,217

Project Expenditure Category: 6.1, Revenue Replacement: Provision of Government Services

Project Overview

The Town has allocated funds for the purchase of two patrol bikes and related equipment for its Public Safety Bike Patrol Unit. These patrol bicycles will allow rangers to patrol the Town's marinas and parks.

Project LR014: Computer Software

Funding amount: \$29,150

Project Expenditure Category: 6.1, Revenue Replacement: Provision of Government Services

Project Overview

The Town has allocated funds for the purchase of computer software for the implementation of Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 87, Leases. This software program will aid the Town in required financial statement disclosures.

Project LR015: Broadway Avenue

Funding amount: \$207,143

Project Expenditure Category: 6.1, Revenue Replacement: Provision of Government Services

Project Overview

The Town has allocated funds for the investment in parks and public outdoor recreation spaces to promote healthier living environments and outdoor recreation and socialization to mitigate the spread of COVID-19. This project is to rehabilitate the courts at Broadway Avenue.

Project LR016: Maintenance Bureau

Funding amount: \$11,749,847

Project Expenditure Category: 6.1, Revenue Replacement: Provision of Government Services

Project Overview

The Town has allocated funds for an enhanced Town Hall Annex. This project includes professional services for design and construction management services to improve municipal facilities. The goal is to modernize infrastructure supporting essential government services, ensuring efficient delivery and accessibility for residents. By investing in upgraded facilities, the Town aims to replace aging infrastructure and enhance operational efficiency, meeting current and future service demands effectively. Furthermore, this project will address the ADA handicap need of our residents.

Project LR017: Outdoor Deck Hockey Rink

Funding amount: \$800,000

Project Expenditure Category: 6.1, Revenue Replacement: Provision of Government Services

Project Overview

The Town has allocated funds for the investment in parks and public outdoor recreation spaces to promote healthier living environments and outdoor recreation and socialization to mitigate the spread of COVID-19. This project is to construct an outdoor deck hockey rink.

Project INFRASEW001: Lexington Village

Funding amount: \$700,000

Project Expenditure Category: 5.3, Clean Water: Decentralized Wastewater

Project Overview

The Town has allocated funds for the replacement of the District's failing on-site sewage treatment plant.

Project INFRA002: Town-wide Drainage Project

Funding amount: \$3,500,875

Project Expenditure Category: 5.6, Clean Water: Stormwater

Project Overview

The Town has allocated funds for the upgrade, repair or replacement/construction of traditional pipe, storage and treatment systems and storm drain inlet protection on various roads throughout the Town. These projects include new recharge basins, excavating, grading and drainage. This project addresses the increased volumes of stormwater likely due to climate change.

Project INFRA003: Town of Islip Regional Shellfish Hatchery

Funding amount: \$5,000,000

Project Expenditure Category: 5.18, Clean Water: Other

Project Overview

The Town has allocated funds for the construction of a new shellfish hatchery facility. This project aims to enhance water quality and support local aquaculture by establishing a state-of-the-art shellfish hatchery. The facility will contribute to ecosystem restoration efforts and sustainable shellfish production, aligning with clean water initiatives to improve environmental health and resilience. By fostering shellfish propagation and water quality improvement, the hatchery will bolster the Town's ecological balance and economic vitality.

Project INFRA004: East Islip Marina Sewer

Funding amount: \$2,000,000

Project Expenditure Category: 5.5, Clean Water: Other Sewer Infrastructure

Project Overview

The Town has allocated funds for the connection of the East Islip Marina to a sewer line. This project aims to improve water quality and environmental sustainability by upgrading the marina's wastewater management infrastructure. The connection to a sewer line will mitigate potential environmental hazards associated with current wastewater disposal practices.

Project DREQUIP001: Purchase of sweepers and vacuum trucks

Funding amount: \$4,157,070

Project Expenditure Category: 5.6, Clean Water: Stormwater

Project Overview

The Town has allocated funds for the purchase of street sweepers and vacuum trucks. These vehicles will enhance municipal efforts to remove debris, pollutants, and trash from streets, which contribute to stormwater system blockages and can pose risks to both environmental and human health. The investment ensures compliance with environmental regulations, supports community cleanliness, and reduces long-term maintenance costs for infrastructure.

Project NEI001: Brentwood Sidewalks

Funding amount: \$2,107,252

Project Expenditure Category: 2.22, Strong Healthy Communities: Neighborhood Features that Promote Health and Safety

Project Overview

The Town has allocated funds for the repair of various sidewalks on Brentwood Road. This project aims to enhance pedestrian safety and accessibility, contributing to a healthier and safer neighborhood environment. The repairs will address sidewalk infrastructure, ensuring compliance with ADA accessibility standards and improving overall community well-being.

Project Stormwater002: Drainage Improvements at Eaton Lane, West Islip

Funding amount: \$1,567,055

Project Expenditure Category: 5.5, Clean Water: Other Sewer Infrastructure

Project Overview

The Town has allocated funds for construction of the Eaton Lane bulkhead and stormwater improvements. ARPA funding will be used to implement stormwater infrastructure improvements that reduce the frequency and severity of localized flooding. These investments address long-standing environmental and public health challenges that have been exacerbated by climate change. By upgrading drainage systems and implementing green infrastructure, the project will protect homes, businesses, and public infrastructure, while improving water quality and reducing emergency response costs.
