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GENERAL OVERVIEW

Executive Summary

York County, Pennsylvania is located in southcentral Pennsylvania, along the Maryland line. The County encompasses 911 square miles including, urban and suburban development, rich agricultural land and abundant natural resources. There are 72 municipalities in the County. The population (2020) is 456,438, with 17.5% of the total over age 65 years. The median household income is \$68,940 and 8.7% of the population is below poverty. There are over 8,600 employer establishments in the County. The racial composition is White alone 80.2%; Black or African American alone 5.6%, American Indian and Alaska Native alone 0.1%, Asian alone 1.4%, Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander 0.03%, Two or More Races 3.7%, and Hispanic or Latino 8.6%.

Like the rest of the country, York County was not spared the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. This public health crisis created uncertain economic situations for County residents, businesses and government. This report will outline the issues, challenges and solutions in York County's response to the COVID-19 pandemic and the County's recovery. In April 2020, the York County Commissioners created the YoCo Strong Recovery Task Force. The Task Force's primary responsibility was to provide guidance for the County's response to the COVID 19 pandemic. In May 2020, the Task Force delivered an exhaustive report with 8 priority recommendations. The report informed the County's allocation of CARES Act funds and other responses to the pandemic.



Utilizing the YoCo Strong Recovery Task Force report as guidance, the County dedicated \$14,761,489 for small business support, and \$1,698,200 for grants to support nonprofits. An additional \$2,122,284 was in direct allocations to non-profit social services for a total of \$18.6 out of the \$40.5 million that was received in CARES Act funding. Grants in the amount of up to \$35,000 were provided for eligible organizations that were negatively impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. The remainder of the funding for York County was allocated as follows:

In April 2021, the York County Commissioners reactivated the YoCo Strong Recovery Task Force and reevaluated the need for updated recommendations to guide the County's recovery process and inform the allocation of \$87 million in American Rescue Plan Act funds. Priority recommendations were shared with the County Commissioners at their June 30 public meeting.

The full task force report identifies dozens of important recommendations to inform the County's current and future recovery. However, there were a number of recommendations that appeared across numerous focus areas which are clearly shared as priorities by the task force.

The YoCo Strong Task Force Priorities are as follows:

- Continue to provide emergency relief to businesses and non-profit organizations impacted by the pandemic and ongoing economic disruptions
- Invest in continued enhancement of York County's emergency response capacity
- Reactivate York County's tourism economy
- Implement the YoCo Fiber countywide broadband strategy to continue closing the digital divide
- Enhance the capacity of public and non-profit social service providers to deliver critical resources and support to county residents
- Continue to prioritize programs that provide rent and mortgage relief
- Foster clear pathways to employment for new or displaced workers
- Invest in programs that expand childcare capacity and childcare workforce

The YoCo Strong Task Force priorities continue to guide the recovery fund implementation in York County as demonstrated subsequently throughout this report.

Uses of Funds

The strategy and goals of the County of York's SLFRF program are evidenced by the programming in place to support a strong and equitable recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic and resultant and concurrent economic downturn. By discussing the programming funded by each of the expenditure categories, a full picture of the broad eligible uses of funds and the specific needs of our jurisdiction are addressed. Funding supports the communities and people in York County. The following sections include information on the allocations of ARPS-SLFRF funding made in York County in each expenditure category. The information contained in subsequent tables is up to date and may have been amended from the 2021 performance report.

a. Public Health (EC1)

Allowable costs under public health include several sub-categories including COVID-19 mitigation and prevention, community violence interventions, behavioral health, and other. The following shows how York County has directed funds in these categories.

 COVID-19 Mitigation and Prevention: This includes COVID-19-related items like vaccination, testing, contact tracing, prevention in congregate settings (including but not limited to nursing homes, prisons/jails, dense work sites, schools, child care facilities), medical expenses, other COVID-19 public health expenses (including communications, enforcement, isolation/quarantine) and COVID-19 assistance to small businesses and non-profits, and aid to impacted industries.

b. Negative Economic Impacts (EC2)

Allowable under this spending category is a variety of household assistance, assistance to small business, assistance to non-profits, aid to impacted industries and other. The following demonstrates how SLFRF funds were used to address these issues in York County.

1. Assistance to Households: This includes food programs, housing assistance and security, services to unemployed or underemployed, healthy child environments and assistance to early learning.

 Assistance to Small Business: In York County, these funds were used as loans or grants to mitigate financial hardship. To support small businesses and nonprofits in York County, the County of York has allocated \$9,500,000 of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) SLFRF funds to provide recovery grant funding through the YoCo Strong Restart Fund Grant 2021, administered by the York County Economic Alliance (YCEA).

The County of York formally engaged the Partnership for Economic Development of York County (PEDYC), a subsidiary entity of the York County Economic Alliance (YCEA) to administer the YoCo Strong Restart grant program on the County's behalf. As administrators, the YCEA conducted extensive outreach, promotion, marketing, and technical assistance services. This included open office hours during traditional business hours, and in the evenings and weekends. In-person business walks throughout York County (hosted several online virtual webinars) and traditional marketing and promotional tactics were also conducted.

- \$232,416.72 was allocated as a 3.5% administrative fee to the YCEA/PEDYC

★ The COVID-19 Hospitality Industry Recover Program or YoCo CHIRP funds were administered by the York County Economic Development Corporation which serves as the Certified Economic Development Organization (CEDO) for York County and is an affiliated entity of the York County Economic Alliance. The YoCo CHIRP awarded grants (ranging from \$5,000 to \$50,000) to eligible hospitality businesses. These grants do not require repayment and are intended to alleviate revenue losses and pay eligible operating expenses due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The eligibility requirements are as follows:

- Must have been in operation by or prior to February 15, 2020
- Must be a for-profit entity and not a publicly traded company
- Must not have a tangible net worth more than \$15 million as of February 15, 2020
- Must have 300 or fewer full-time equivalent employees (FTE's)
- Must have a physical location in York County, PA and must file a federal and state tax return. The grant program's priority will be to exhaust all funds to individual award recipients before funding multiple entities with common ownership
- Must have a NAICS designation within the accommodation sector (721) or Food Services and Drinking Places sector (722)
- May be structured as a C-corporation, S-corporation, limited liability company, partnership, or sole proprietorship
- Must be in operations and cannot cease operations within one year of the date of the application.

To fully fund all eligible CHIRP applicants, the York County Board of Commissioners voted unanimously to provide \$1,509,805 in funding from the County's allocation of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). Ultimately, all recipients were awarded grant funds in two installments. The first installment was approximately 75% of their grant award. This funding round exhausted all CHIRP funds received by the County. Following that, upon the receipt of ARPA funding, the York County Commissioners proceeded to formally allocate and transfer \$1,509,805 in ARPA funding to the YCEA to award the balance of the recipients grant award. This was an effective way to leverage both CHIRP and ARPA funding to award 100% of eligible applicants and support the stabilization and recovery of 223 businesses within York County. Grants were awarded to businesses in 22 different townships, 21 boroughs and the City of York. The awards ranged from \$5,000 to \$50,000.

5. Other: In York County, these funds were used to provide economic impact assistance.

b. Public Health-Negative Economic Impact: Public Sector Capacity (EC 3)

York County, Pennsylvania has no expenditures in the EC3 Public Health-Negative Economic Impact: Public Sector Capacity.

c. Premium Pay (EC 4)

As stated in the compliance guidance, recipients may provide premium pay for work performed at any time since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic. Premium pay must be "in

addition to" wages and remuneration already received and tea obligation to provide such premium pay must not have been incurred by the recipient prior to March 3, 2021.

Although the County has remained open throughout the pandemic to serve our citizens, none of the federal funding for assistance has been utilized for Premium Pay for County employees or employees of other businesses receiving assistance.

d. Water, Sewer, and Broadband Infrastructure (EC 5)

As stated in the compliance guidance, *recipients may use SLFRF award funds to make necessary investments in water, sewer and broadband infrastructure.* For the County of York, the only funds allocated under the general EC 5: Water, Sewer, and Broadband Infrastructure category were for investments in broadband infrastructure.

York County is not unlike many other areas of the state and the country in that the COVID-19 pandemic has exacerbated the impact of inequitable access to broadband internet in many areas. The importance of reliable, fast, and affordable internet access continues to be one of the major lessons of the pandemic and a crucial part of recovery efforts.

The County of York, the York County Economic Alliance, and YoCo Fiber Broadband Task Force are working collectively with the joint goal of countywide broadband access to bring faster, more reliable, and more affordable internet to all homes and businesses in York County. Broadband is crucial infrastructure for education, telehealth, business, and general quality of life. By investing in broadband and supporting public private partnerships to connect internet to homes and businesses, it can be ensured that York County is an attractive place to live and a competitive place to do business.



York County gained state and national attention for its proactive use of CARES funds to begin the process of expanding countywide broadband. Effective work on this initiative continues utilizing ARPA-SLFRF funding. The County is currently working to expand services and provide Wi-Fi service for Seven Valleys, Glen Rock, Railroad and New Freedom Boroughs.

The Task Force continued to be active in its advisement on implementation of its broadband strategy, in particular the preliminary design and recommendations outlined in the community assessment. The Task Force conducted a survey of residents which prioritized construction phases, recommended ownership and financial models for county-constructed infrastructure and potential leasing agreements for use of the County's fiber, secured grants, engaged public and private partners and informed the County Commissioners.

Expanding broadband internet access is also a signature goal of the recently adopted York County Economic Action Plan, which is a component of York County's Comprehensive Plan. Broadband access is recognized as a priority in other County and statewide planning documents and initiatives. Recently, The County Commissioners' Association of Pennsylvania (CCAP) identified broadband expansion as a top statewide priority.



To support this project which is vital for York County's recovery, the York County Commissioners have allocated up to \$25 million of ARPA-SLFRF funding to further expand broadband service within the County.

In the expenditure category of Infrastructure: Broadband- "Last Mile" Projects, ARPA-SLFRF funding will be utilized to design and develop an urban Wi-Fi system. Using a terrestrial fixed wireless technology, over 22,000 households will be served.

f. Revenue Replacement (EC6)

Due to the substantial loss of revenues associated with the Judicial System, a significant portion of funds will be utilized to cover court and court-related costs. A large portion of funds will also be allocated to support the York County Prison operations and care of prisoners. A portion of funds will also be utilized to support York County 911 operations. All remaining funds will be allocated to matching funds for County human services departments including Children, Youth and Families, Aging, Mental Health and Intellectual Disabilities, and Domestic Relations

Promoting equitable outcomes

York County's efforts to promote equitable outcomes is guided by the priorities set forth by the YoCo Strong Recovery Task Force. During their August 18, 2021 meeting the York County Board of Commissioners allocated \$1,500,000 of funding to community service partners for the programs that serve many York County residents who were disproportionately impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. These organizations serve those impacted by COVID-19 in the areas of housing and food insecurity, mental health and wellness, child care, education, and public health.

The table below presents information on the community organizations that received funding, along with their mission or programming goal for the funding.

The United Way of York County has served our community for over a century. Their work and the efforts of the community organization supported by the donations are guided by essential core values. Integrity that shows in all relationships with each other and with the greater community. All are conducted with high ethical standards and are based on honesty and respect. There is accountability and transparency. Funds are managed responsibly. Diversity is valued and inclusion is always at the forefront. Teamwork and collaboration are essential for the good of the community. By entrusting SLFRF funds to the community organizations that are under this umbrella of service, assistance to the marginalized, underserved, and adversely affected groups is safeguarded.

Equally importantly, since the submission of the 2021 Recovery Plan Performance Report, the County of York has done some introspection and strategic planning. The initiative, Building a Better York County, is a multifaceted process that looked inward to County government and outward to the relationship with the citizens in our community. The purpose, at its core, is simple but powerful: to strengthen the quality of life. To accomplish this and to help build a better York County, the core values of dedication, transparency and inclusivity are important. These core values are to be exhibited throughout the work of the County, particularly in how assistance and aid is provided to those impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.



Overall, funding to these community organizations furthers several of the priorities of the YoCo Strong Task Force, the overarching guidance for COVID recovery in York County. First and foremost, is to enhance the capacity of public and non-profit social service providers to deliver critical resources and support to county residents.

To continue to prioritize programs that address the overall issue of housing insecurity, including rent and mortgage relief, funding was provided a variety of organizations. The Alliance for Low Income Personal Care Homes Advancement (ALPHA) assisted in the administration of funding to seven personal care homes around the County. These PCHs are licensed and provide housing for low income residents who can no longer live independently. A total of \$215,000 was allocated across the seven homes to provide funding for COVID-19 health and safety improvements, loss in funds due to decreased allowable occupancy due to COVID restrictions. The administration of ARPA-SLFRF funding in this area preserved housing for a total of 137 residents, all of which are SSI (Supplemental Security Income) residents that fall far below the national average for poverty.

Funding was also provided to two non-profit affordable housing developers to help offset the increased lumber costs from the market volatility resulting from the global pandemic.

Sparrow's Way will provide 23 affordable housing townhomes. Kellinger Greene is a 56 unit new construction Low Income Tax Credit (LITC) project. These projects together provide an additional 79 affordable housing units to low income families and individuals in York County.

Another key priority of the YoCo Strong Task Force which is addressed by the allocation and administration of ARPA-SLFRF funds in York County investment in programs that expand child care capacity and childcare workforce. There are over 18,000 children in York County under the age of five who require Child Care. In pre-COVID times, roughly 45% of eligible children received services including Child Care Works, Pre-K Counts, and Head Start. Due to COVID-19, 35 York County programs that served approximately 1,000 children had to close either temporarily or permanently. In March 2022, the majority of York County child care programs were operating at reduced enrollment because of the inability to hire teachers. This is negatively impacting the local

economy because people cannot enter or remain in the workforce if they do not have reliable and affordable child care.

The York County Commissioners earmarked \$1,000,000 of the ARPA-SFRF recovery funding for early childhood development. Of that total, Child Care Consultants was allocated \$250,000 to administer the York County ELIC Early Childhood Educator Award Project. In connection with Keystone Stars, the State established an Education &

Retention Award (ERA) Program. This program provided cash awards to staff of Star 2, 3 and 4 providers based on their education level and their hours worked. The program was designed to encourage ECE staff to continue their education and to stay in the profession. The grants were discontinued in FY 2021-2022. Child Care Consultants will follow this same process to administer the awarded funding to child care providers. A total of 123 child care center staff ad directors received awards ranging from \$600-\$4100.

Another priority of COVID-19 relief funding focus on the older members of the community. One million dollars was set aside to address the disproportionate impacts that COVID-19 has had on seniors. To start, each of the County's 14 senior centers were awarded \$50,000. Largely affected by the losses in revenues during the initial shutdown and changes in business practices due the pandemic, these funds sustained the Senior Centers. Perhaps the most significant activity of the senior centers is to provide life-sustaining nutrition to older

York Countians. With just a partial number of senior centers reporting, almost 458,000 home delivered and congregate meal and pickups were distributed countywide during the pandemic. It is likely that the total number of meals far surpasses this as not all senior centers reported this data. Along with providing balanced foods, meal distributions served as wellness checks as many segments of our populations, particularly seniors, became more isolated during the shutdown.

As a jurisdiction, York County's project implementation reflects the focus areas indicated in the final rule. As stated:

Negative Economic Impacts (EC 2): assistance to households, small businesses, and nonprofits to address impacts of the pandemic, which have been most severe among lowincome populations. This includes assistance with food, housing, and other needs; employment programs for people with barriers to employment who faced negative economic impacts from the pandemic (such as residents of low-income neighborhoods, minorities, disconnected youth, the unemployed, formerly incarcerated people, veterans, and people with disabilities); services to provide long-term housing security and housing supports, address educational disparities, or provide child care and early learning services; and other strategies that provide impacted and disproportionately impacted communities with services to address the negative economic impacts of the pandemic.

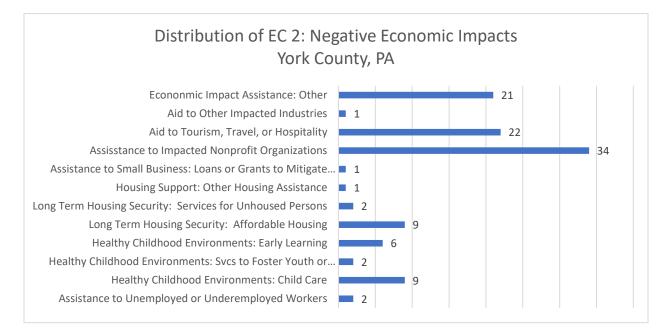
York County's first annual Recovery Plan (2021) describe the initial efforts and intended outcomes to promote equity. This year, the annual Recovery Plan provides an update on how this

jurisdiction's approach achieved or promoted equitable outcomes or progressed against equity goals.

As shown on the figure below, almost one third of the ARPA-SLFRF funding in the EC 2: Negative Economic Impacts was directed to assistance to impacted non-profits, many of which have and continue to assist those who face any number or combination of barriers including residing in low-income neighborhoods, minority populations, the unemployed, those who are disabled, etc. By directing such a significant amount of funding to nonprofits in the community that served the most disadvantaged in the community. Highlighted previously were initiatives that particularly benefitted seniors, the very young, and those with needs for affordable housing.



The leadership of the County who are the executive decision makers with regards to the allocation of recovery funds also set aside \$1 million to be directed to our community's veterans. This is an extension of the commitment the County has made to those who have served in the divisions of the US military. A significant accomplishment in York County is the Veterans Treatment Courts, or VTC. This is a hybrid Drug and Mental Health Court that recognizes the unique military culture while addressing distinct veteran issues, such as post-traumatic stress disorder, traumatic brain injury, and military sexual trauma. The goal of this specialized treatment or diversionary court is to help defendants stay out of the criminal justice system by addressing underlying causes of criminal behavior. They also save taxpayer money by keeping offenders out of York County Prison. Designated funding through the ARPA-SLFRF will provide additional resources and access to support community based mental health and other support services that veterans need, including those that have been adjudicated through the criminal justice system. Working though the County's Department of Veterans Affairs and the York County Veterans Outreach, housing, transportation, food, training, therapy, employment opportunities, childcare, home maintenance and physical/behavioral health care are among the areas in which veterans can obtain assistance.

Significant funding was set aside to aid tourism, travel or hospitality industries that were among the organizations that were most definitely impacted negatively by COVID-19.

Countywide, just over \$5.2 million was allocated in EC 2.35 Aid to Tourism, Travel, and Hospitality, as shown in the table below. Explore York, the County's convention and visitors' bureau, received \$875,000 for its tourism grants program. Both the Appell Center and the Eichelberger Performing Arts Center each received sizeable allocations of recovery funds. York County organizations that promote and interpret the history of the region were also granted SLFRF funds including the York History Center, the Northern Central Railroad, the Susquehanna National Heritage Area, and the Ma and Pa Railroad Preservation Society were also awarded recovery funds.

Allocations were also made to other arts and cultural institutions. One such organization to highlight in this area is the York Art Association. York Art Association began in 1905 when three visual artists and several businessmen came together to exchange views and interests. Called The York Art Club, they met regularly in homes and then meeting places, eventually renting space to hold meetings, drawing sessions and exhibits. Over the years the club moved to several different venues in York.

Throughout its 115 year history, the York Art Association's focus continues to be "to encourage and develop an interest in the visual arts". Through its many aspects including gallery exhibits, education programs and special events, the York Art Association continues to provide its members and the community with a place to participate, observe and appreciate the visual arts.

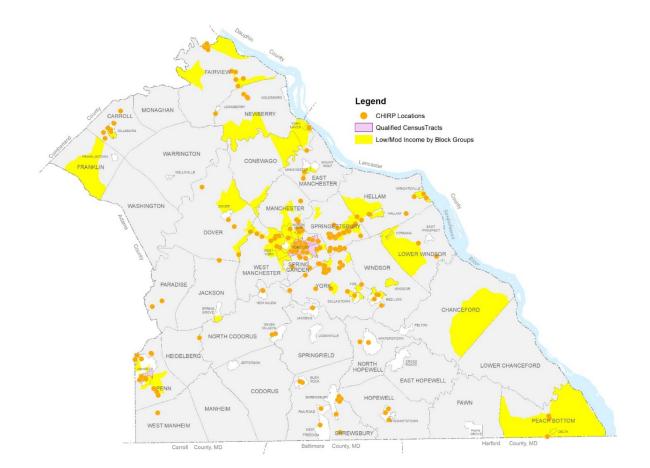

As reviewed previously, the County of York has also allocated American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to support small businesses and nonprofits in York County. This support was provided by recovery grant funding through the YoCo Strong Restart Fund Grant 2021, administered by the York County Economic Alliance (YCEA). The YCEA also administered the CHIRP program, providing assistance to the hospitality industry. The map to follow shows the CHIRP locations in the County as related to the qualified census tracts and low/moderate income household by block group.



Community Engagement

Through the height of COVID-19 pandemic, the primary way in which the community's needs and priorities were identified and addressed was through the YoCo Strong Recovery Task Force. The York County Commissioners created the Task Force at the onset of the global pandemic. Representatives from offices within County government, local business, human service agencies, public health organizations, and other key leaders serve on the Task Force. Pivotal work of the task force early on was an exhaustive report with eight priority recommendations which are outlined in the executive summary of this report.

The YoCo Strong Recovery Task Force worked effectively as a voice of the community during the pandemic and in the ensuing and continuing recovery. The targeted approach used by experts in the respective fields mobilized the efforts to identify needs and implement recovery

actions. Convening this group at the early stage of the pandemic served the community well. With experts in place, the process to identify strengths and weakness and to deliver relief funding was expedited.

The greater York County community was engaged in a variety of ways. <u>www.preparedyork.com</u> was developed as a clearinghouse of related information for individuals, organizations and businesses seeking information regarding recovery resources, emergency assistance, job postings and other community resources. The leadership at the York County Economic Alliance in cooperation with the York County Commissioners kept the public informed.

Not unlike other places around the nation, broadband is a key emergent issue from the COVID-19 pandemic facing York County. The York County Commissioners, York County Economic Alliance, and YoCo Fiber Broadband Task Force continue to work towards the goal of countywide broadband access to bring faster, more reliable, and more affordable internet to York County homes and businesses. Broadband is critical infrastructure for education, telehealth, business, telework and the general quality of life. By investing in broadband and supporting public private partnerships to connect internet to homes and businesses, York County remains attractive to live and a competitive place to do business. In the summer of 2021, every household in the County was asked to take part in a survey about issues and concerns regarding the current internet service. The inadequacies that surfaced during the pandemic and were highlighted in the survey have made YOCO Fiber and the expansion of broadband very necessary. Work continues to provide progress on broadband coverage and reliability in York County.

Labor Practices

Construction of the broadband project will be publicly bid and awarded following the County of York's standard policy. Qualified public bidders who can also demonstrate enhanced community benefit through local hiring will be considered favorably and the project will support local employment and local business enterprises.

A recipient will be required to provide certification that, for all the relevant projects, all laborers and mechanics employed by contractors and subcontractors in the performance of such project are paid wages at rates not less than those prevailing, as determined by the US Secretary of Labor in accordance with subchapter IV of Chapter 31 of Title 40, United States Code, more commonly known as the Davis-Bacon Act.

Use of Evidence

At this point, none of the projects underway in York County are documenting evidence based interventions. The County will work with recipients to document evidenced based interventions as the projects are developed.

Performance Report

The County of York is very pleased by the way in which the ARPA SLFRF recovery funds have been distributed throughout the County and the manner in which the community organizations have effectively administered the programs and services to assist those in the county most affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. A quarterly reporting process was carefully developed. Each subrecipient was provided a personalized reporting form electronically for review and completion. The reporting forms include the required and necessary information to inform this performance report and the quarterly reporting to the US Treasury. This annual submission will focus on the key indicators emphasized in the guidance. Subsequent annual reports will expand on these indicators and provide additional context and information as available and pertinent.

In the areas of *Household Assistance (EC 2.2), Long-Term Housing Security (EC 2.15-2.16) and Housing Support (EC 2.17-2.18)*, York County has provided a total of \$940,386 of ARPA-SLFRF funding to 12 organizations. About 65% of that total funding went to two affordable housing construction projects to offset the significant increase in lumber costs resulting from the pandemic. Another considerable portion of the funding (23%) in these categories was to support the advancement of the low income personal care homes in York County, of which there are seven.

The balance of the funding in these categories (13%) was designated to housing support for unhoused persons and other housing assistance with funding to the Bell Family Shelter, the YMCA of York County and the Salvation Army. Services provided to individuals and families by these organizations include family congregate shelter, case management, and food and housing supports. To date, 122 households have received eviction prevention services (including legal representation). Almost 100 (95) affordable housing units have been preserved or developed.



With regard to Assistance to Unemployed or Underemployed Workers (EC 2.10) and Community Violence Interventions (EC 1.11), York County has allocated a total of \$24,100 to Penn-Mar Human Services and Crispus Attucks Association to assist the unemployed and underemployed. In EC 1.11, a total of \$79,000 was designated to 3 organizations (4 programs) for community violence interventions (the Children's Advocacy Center, the YWCA of Hanover domestic violence shelter, and the Victim Assistance Center at the YWCA of York County. There are over a dozen workers enrolled in and sectoral job training programs.

York County did not direct any ARPA-SLFRF funding to the following ECs: Addressing Educational Disparities (EC 2.24-2.26) and Addressing Impacts of Lost Instructional Time (EC 2.27).

In the area of *Healthy Childhood Environments (EC 2.11-2.14)*, York County designated a total of \$708,300. Of that total, 40% of the funds were in EC 2.11: Healthy Childhood Environments: Child Care with \$283,800 distributed across nine agencies. Two organizations (Children's Home of York and Pressley Ridge) received funding (\$35,400 total) for EC 2.13: Services to Foster Youth or Families involved in Child Welfare System. Six organizations received a total of \$389,100 under EC 2.14: Education Assistance: Early Learning. Funding in this EC was directed to the Crispus Attucks Association, Hanover Area YMCA, YMCA of York and York County, YWCA of Hanover, and YWCA York. An innovative use of these funds was the York County ELIC Early Childhood Educator Award Project administered by Child Care Consultants.

The York County ELIC Early Childhood Educator Award Project was developed in connection with the State of PA and Keystone Stars – the Education and Retention Award (ERA) Program. This program provided cash awards to staff of Star 2, 3 and 4 providers based on their education level and their hours worked. The program was designed to encourage early childhood education staff to continue their education and to stay in the profession. The considerable grant provided stipends/bonuses to 90 early childcare center staff members and 33 directors. The stipends varied by Star Certification. In all, 4,080 children were served by childcare and early learning services (pre-school/pre-K/ ages 3-5). 350 families were served by home visiting.

Subsequent annual performance reports may include updated data for the performance period as well as prior period data, and necessary narrative to provide additional context and help with interpretation of results and to understand any changes in the key performance indicators.

The York County ARPA-SLFRF funding has been directed to over 100 projects across the County. Funds are helping to address food and housing insecurity, employment, public and mental health, and child care and education among other things. As always, the County of York strives to build a better York County through inclusive, transparent and dedicated service to our residents. Concerted efforts have been made to reach the most vulnerable in our community with the ARPA-SLFRF funding, particularly the older residents and the very young. Continued supports to our local businesses, non-profits, and the hard-hit travel industry will continue.

PROJECT INVENTORY

In the County of York, we have several major project areas with focused community outcomes. Primarily, they are in the areas of Government Provisions, Broadband Expansion, Assistance to Small Businesses, and Assistance to Vulnerable Populations (including Children and the Aging in our community). Fully committed to promoting equitable outcomes, the allocations were aligned with the funding decisions made annually by the United Way. The United Way of York ensures that race, ethnicity, gender, income and other relevant factors are all taken into consideration. The recovery funding administered through York County was intended and is serving and assisting those most affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. Helpful and gracious feedback has been received from the subrecipient organizations.

As part of the following Project Inventory, Programmatic Data is included, where applicable. As of current reporting details received at the end of June 2022, the recovery efforts in York County have supported over 122 households in receiving eviction-prevention services, and have helped to develop or preserve 95 affordable housing units. There are approximately a dozen individuals enrolled in and completing sectoral job training as part of our Assistance to Unemployed or Under-Employed Workers. Additionally, York County SLFRF funds have aided over 4,080 Children to receive appropriate childcare and safe early learning environments, as well as over 350 families served by home visiting. These successes are included and broken down in each project below. The County of York is providing recovery funding to subrecipients across the County in a comprehensive, equitable, and efficient manner to help those individuals, families, and organizations most negatively impacted by COVID-19.

Our jurisdiction has defined major SLFRF-funded projects as those with an allocation in the amount of \$1 million or greater. The projects that meet that threshold are as follows:

The County of York formally engaged York County's Certified Economic Development Organization (CEDO), the York County Economic Development Corporation (YCEDC) a subsidiary entity of the York County Economic Alliance

(YCEA) to administer the CHIRP grant program on the County's behalf. A total of 272 applications were received. In accordance with Act 1, \$136,000 was allocated as an administrative fee to the YCEA/YCEDC. Of the 272 applicants, 223 were determined as eligible. The full amount of CHIRP funding, less the administrative fee, \$4,950,195 was disbursed in small business grants to 223 eligible recipients. Because the total amount requested by the 223 eligible recipients was \$6,460,000. In effort to fully fund all eligible applicants, the York County Board of Commissioners voted unanimously to provide \$1,509,805 in funding from the County's allocation of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). Ultimately, all recipients were awarded grant funds in two installments. The first installment was approximately 75% of their grant award. This funding round exhausted all CHIRP funds received by the County. Following that, upon the receipt of ARPA funding, the York County Commissioners proceeded to formally allocate and transfer \$1,509,805 in ARPA funding to the YCEA to award the balance of the recipients grant award. This was an effective way to leverage both CHIRP and ARPA funding to award 100% of eligible applicants and support the stabilization and recovery of 223 businesses within York County's hospitality sector.

Description: The Maryland & Pennsylvania Railroad Preservation Society operates the Ma & Pa Railroad Heritage Village, a living-history museum highlighting the role of the railroad in Muddy Creek Forks in the early 1900s. In 2021 we promoted the recovery of York County tourism, resuming a full schedule of operations with COVID protocols to protect visitors and staff. Visitation was up 219% over 2020, even though our Christmas event ran at half capacity due to the high rate of infection in our area. Despite the uncertainty of operating revenues, we made major investments in the future of the museum. About \$78,000 was expended on our shop at High Rock to correct structural issues and make the building compliant with building codes and ADA requirements. Another \$66,500 was spent to rebuild the road crossing at High Rock and to construct a siding for storage and maintenance of railroad equipment, and the historic A. M. Grove mansion was painted and received a new boiler at a cost of about \$23,000. Our 2021 expenditures for operations and capital improvements exceeded our revenues by more than \$60,000. This represents a significant infusion of funds to boost the local economy. Since we have expended far in excess of \$25,000 for eligible activities in 2021, we request that our entire \$25,000 allocation of ARPA funds be distributed to the Society.

These financial setbacks caused an increase in carrying costs including a significant increase in interest payments and contractor general conditions. We have also seen a significant increase in construction material costs and delays in the supply chain for the Yorktowne Hotel project. With 36 prime contractors and approximately 70 workers on site each day, the construction schedule was impacted greatly by a shifting in protocols to keep workers socially distanced, safe, and to reduce exposures as much as possible. The timeline delayed construction and shifted the completion to almost another full year, which ultimately hurts the slowly reopening tourism economy. We are looking forward to completion in the fall of 2022. The IDA also owns PeoplesBank Park, which it leases to York Professional Baseball, the operating entity for the York Revolution professional baseball team. The Revolution drastically reduced their number of home games and spectator capacity during the past 24 months, in accordance with CDC and state social distancing guidelines and other business restrictions. This resulted in significant lost revenue, which made them unable to pay full rent to the IDA. IDA provided rent forgiveness to the Revolution during the last two seasons, for which the ARPA funding will provide partial relief.

The need to put protocols in place to help protect our community forced us to move many of our services to telehealth. This included our Supervised Visitation program, which meant altering schedules to much shorter visits to accommodate the needs of foster families and the attention spans of younger children. The program also lost significant revenue because telehealth delivery prohibited us from billing for our planned transportation costs. Despite these challenges, we understood that our services were too important to the community and the families that we serve to put them on hold or discontinue them for any period of time. All PRIFS services have continued to be provided for the entirety of the pandemic and our entire staff has been maintained.

Our Quantum students suffered due to problems connecting for virtual education, staying motivated without the in person connections. Starting in September 2020, even though school was still virtual in York City, our Quantum students were able to meet with the Quantum mentor on at least a weekly basis. The students still had time to gather and prepare for moving to the next level in high school, graduation and/or preparing for college or trade school. They met in smaller groups to maintain the socially distancing that COVID-19 has required. Starting for school year 2021-2022, the Quantum students are again meeting in person 4 days a week and we are in the process to growing the program to 75 students for this school year.
