#### Activity #2: Port Bienville Trans-Loading Terminal Facility Completion (Modified)

This Project was accepted under Mississippi's Initial MIP. Project activities are complete, and the grant award has been closed.

#### Activity #11: Planning Assistance - MIP Amendment and Application Development (Modified)

This project was accepted under Mississippi's Initial MIP to provide planning assistance to support the Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality (MDEQ) in the development of multiple MIP amendments. MDEQ has

received a planning assistance award from the U.S. Department of the Treasury (Treasury) for this project. The proposed project modification includes an increase in funding for this project to support MDEQ in the development of future MIP amendments and applications. There is no modification to the Project Description, Need, Purpose, Objective, Location, Milestones, or Success Criteria as outlined and accepted in MIP Amendment #7.

**Project Modification:** This project budget is being modified to increase the Direct Component funding by \$600,000. Direct Component funds will also be used for activities associated with grant application development for projects on the accepted MIP, project oversight and management activities, and the development, coordination, and execution grant awards between MDEQ and Treasury. #### Activity #42: Trent Lott International Airport Apron Expansion (Modified)

**Project Modification:** The project budget is being modified to increase the Direct Component funding by \$1,100,000 and third-party funding by \$3,823,000. The project description is being modified to include anticipated activities such as construction of additional aprons, access roads, taxiways, and installation of utilities at the Trent Lott International Airport. Additionally, the project name is being modified to Trent Lott International Airport

Apron Expansion to clarify that work is not limited to the north apron area. Other activities may be added/finalized with the grant application after completion of engineering and design, or prior to requesting Notice to Proceed with construction from Treasury. The project activities are consistent with the Need, Purpose, Objective, Location, Milestones, and Success Criteria previously accepted by Treasury. This project will support infrastructure benefitting the economy of the Gulf Coast Region by constructing aircraft aprons, access roads, utilities and taxiways at the Trent Lott International Airport (TLIA) in Jackson County, MS; this project qualifies as an eligible activity for Direct Component funding under 31 C.F.R. §34.201(f)- infrastructure benefitting the economy or ecological resources, and 33 U.S.C. §1321 (t)(1)(B)(i)(VI) of the RESTORE Act. This activity will be implemented by Jackson County Airport Authority and will comply with the definition of infrastructure in 31 C.F.R. §34.2.

#### Activity #44: Mississippi Cyber and Technology Center

This proposed project will support workforce development and job creation in the Gulf Coast Region by supporting construction of the Mississippi Cyber and Technology Center (MCTC), anticipated to be constructed at the Keesler Air Force Base in Biloxi, MS, to enhance workforce cybersecurity in Mississippi.

The MCTC is part of the state of Mississippi's Cyber Initiative (MCI), led by the Mississippi State University Research and Technology Corporation (RTC), whose mission is to prepare a trained workforce to meet the current and future cybersecurity needs of various industries. Cybersecurity is essential for advancing high-performance computing, autonomous systems, artificial intelligence, virtual reality, advanced manufacturing, machine learning, modeling and simulation, and more. With a population of approximately 400,000 people along the Mississippi Gulf Coast and a supportive business environment, the region excels in autonomy, shipbuilding, aerospace and defense, advanced manufacturing, energy, and petrochemical industries. The MCTC will support Mississippi in providing a trained workforce to meet current and future demands of the robust cybersecurity industry, fostering collaboration that will strengthen cybersecurity, accelerate research and innovation, and create economic opportunities for the Mississippi Gulf Coast and the state. The MCTC may include classrooms and training facilities, digital forensics labs, meeting and office space, and a technology incubator for private sector development in cyber-related fields and security.

Activities necessary to complete this proposed project may include, but are not limited to, engineering and design, permitting, construction site preparation, and construction. Other activities may be added/finalized with the grant application, after completion of engineering and design, or prior to requesting Notice to Proceed with construction from Treasury. Direct Component funds may also be used for project oversight and management activities; the development, coordination, and execution of the grant award between MDEQ and Treasury; and the development, coordination, and execution of the sub-award between MDEQ and the subrecipient.

This proposed project aligns with the workforce development and education priorities developed by the Governor's Gulf Coast Advisory Committee.

**Need:** A training facility is needed to support current and future cybersecurity workforce needs of existing and expanding industry sectors on the Mississippi Gulf Coast.

**Purpose:** The purpose of this project is to provide infrastructure capacity to support workforce training for the cybersecurity field.

**Objective:** Assist with the construction of the Mississippi Cyber and Technology Center to support workforce development for the cybersecurity field.

#### Activity #45: Port of Pascagoula Infrastructure Improvements

This proposed project will support infrastructure benefitting the economy of the Gulf Coast Region through the construction of bulkhead and facility improvements at the Port of Pascagoula in Jackson County, MS.

The Port of Pascagoula, located on the southeastern coast of Mississippi, is a full-service deep-water port strategically located on federal shipping channels. The Port is nine miles from Interstate 10 giving access to U.S. interstate/highway systems and has close working partnerships with rail service providers. The Port's two harbors (Pascagoula River and Bayou Casotte) include a combination of public and private terminals handling a combined 32 million tons of cargo through its channels annually. Without bulkhead and facility improvements, Jackson County's ability to support existing industry and recruit new industry is limited by current bulkhead and facility capacity at the Port of Pascagoula. This proposed project anticipates the construction of bulkhead and facility improvements to support the Port of Pascagoula.

Activities necessary to complete this proposed project may include, but are not limited to, engineering and design, permitting, construction site preparation, construction, and dredging. Other activities may be added/finalized with the grant application, after completion of engineering and design, or prior to requesting Notice to Proceed with construction from Treasury. Direct Component funds may also be used for project oversight and management activities; the development, coordination, and execution of the grant award between MDEQ and Treasury; and the development, coordination, and execution of the sub-award between MDEQ and the subrecipient.

This proposed project aligns with the infrastructure and economic development priorities developed by the Governor's Gulf Coast Advisory Committee.

**Need:** The Port of Pascagoula in Jackson County, MS is in need of additional and improved bulkhead and facility space to support local economic growth.

Purpose: The purpose of this project is to provide construction support for bulkhead and facility improvements.

**Objective:** Increase available bulkhead and docking capacity to accommodate new tenant business, expansion of existing tenant business, or an increase in maritime-related industry activity to benefit the economy.

This project will support infrastructure benefitting the economy of the Gulf Coast Region through infrastructure improvements at the HCDC rail yard in Gulfport, MS; this project qualifies as an eligible activity for Direct Component funding under 31 C.F.R. §34.201(f)- infrastructure benefitting the economy or ecological resources, and 33 U.S.C. §1321 (t)(1)(B)(i)(VI) of the RESTORE Act. This activity will be implemented by the Harrison County Development Commission and will comply with the definition of infrastructure in 31 C.F.R. §34.2.

2. Please summarize the process for developing the draft multiyear implementation plan, including how projects were initially evaluated and prioritized, and how the entity made the draft multiyear implementation plan available for a minimum of 45 days for public review and comment, in a manner calculated to obtain broad-based participation from individuals, businesses, Indian tribes, and non-profit organizations, such as through public meetings, presentations in languages other than English, and postings on the Internet.

The projects were prioritized using the following:

1. Mississippi utilized three stakeholder-driven components to identify and prioritize all projects for inclusion in MIP Amendment #8: Stakeholder Meetings; The Governor's Gulf Coast Advisory Committee (GCAC); and the Restoration Project Idea Portal. Items (a) through (e) below provide further explanation for the GCAC process:

- (a) Governor Tate Reeves created the GCAC to serve as an advisory body to the Governor for recommendation of projects to be funded for Mississippi under the RESTORE Act.
- (b) The GCAC is comprised of over 70 engaged stakeholders, including private citizens, non-governmental organizations, business owners, elected officials, and other community leaders from the Mississippi Coast.
- (c) The GCAC formed six sub-committees that focused on six key areas related to the activities specified in the RESTORE Act (Eco-restoration, Economic Development, Infrastructure, Seafood, Tourism, and Workforce Development/Research & Education).
- (d) On March 8, 2024, MDEQ released a public "call for projects" soliciting project ideas from the public for funding consideration on this amended MIP.
- (e) On May 20, 2024, Governor Reeves convened the GCAC to begin selection of recommended projects for this amended MIP. Each sub-committee member was sent a list of projects previously selected for funding within their respective category and provided a list of remaining portal projects related to their respective committee category.
- (e) The GCAC sub-committees met, and each produced a list of recommended projects for submittal to the Governor's office. After deliberation, the Governor selected projects to fund.

Each of the projects identified in MIP Amendment #8 were developed and informed directly from a project (or projects) submitted in the Restoration Project Idea Portal.

Additionally, MDEQ completed due diligence activities on each project to evaluate constructability, feasibility, logistics, eligibility determinations, and environmental compliance reviews to confirm recommended projects could be funded by the Direct Component of the RESTORE Act.

2. All projects included in MIP Amendment #8 are eligible for RESTORE Act funding under the Direct Component eligible activities for: infrastructure projects benefitting the economy or ecological resources; and planning assistance.

Mississippi Governor Tate Reeves announced the amended MIP on November 13, 2024. On December 16, 2024, MDEQ published its amended MIP for public review and comment. A notice was published in the Sun Herald and Clarion-Ledger newspapers informing the public that the amended MIP was available for public review and comment. An email blast was also sent to those registered to receive notices. This amended MIP was made available for public review and comment for a total of 61 days, from December 16, 2024, until February 14, 2025. The amended MIP and a corresponding map were available to the public, directly downloadable, through <a href="https://www.restore.ms">www.restore.ms</a>, and were also available upon request via email, fax, telephone, or mail directly from MDEQ. The amended MIP was available in English, Spanish, and Vietnamese upon request. Documentation to demonstrate that this MIP Amendment #8 was made available for public comment for at least 45 days is attached as Exhibit B.

MDEQ accepted public comments and input electronically via <a href="www.restore.ms">www.restore.ms</a>, as well as via email, fax, telephone, or mail directly to MDEQ. On December 16, 2024 and January 13, 2025, MDEQ delivered an email blast to remind those registered to receive notices that the public review and comment period for the amended MIP would close on February 14, 2025. A final email blast was delivered on February 10, 2025, as a reminder that the public review and comment period for the amended MIP would close on February 14, 2025.

During the public review and comment period, MDEQ received a total of two (2) sets of written comments. No other public comments were submitted. All comments have been summarized for purposes of this response. A copy of all meaningful public comments received is attached as Exhibit C. All comments submitted during the public review and comment period were reviewed and considered by MDEQ. Each activity in the amended MIP was adopted after consideration of meaningful input from the public. Changes made as a result of meaningful comments are included below.

This document includes the following sections:

Section 1: Comments on Specific Projects on Amended MIP – None Received.

Section 2: General Comments on MIP Amendment #8

MDEQ received two (2) comments opposing funding and modifications as presented in MIP Amendment #8 due to an established system and process that systematically excludes Black stakeholders input.

MDEQ disagrees with this accusation. The RESTORE Act provides that as a condition of receiving amounts from the Trust Fund, a Gulf Coast State shall, among other conditions, certify that the projects or programs for which the Gulf Coast State is requesting amounts was selected based on meaningful input from the public, including broad-based participation from individuals, businesses, and nonprofit organizations (33 USC 1321 (t)(1)(E)(ii)(III)). Regarding public input, the RESTORE Act further states, "In meeting any condition of this paragraph, a Gulf Coast State may use an appropriate procedure for public consultation in that Gulf Coast State, including consulting with one or more established task forces or other entities, to develop recommendations for proposed projects and programs that would restore and protect the natural resources, ecosystems, fisheries, marine and wildlife habitats, beaches, coastal wetlands, and economy of the Gulf Coast." (33 USC 1321 (t)(1)(I)). Treasury's implementing regulations published at 31 CFR Part 34 outline the application procedure for Direct Component Funds saying "Before an eligible entity may receive a Direct Component activity grant, the grant applicant must submit a Multiyear Implementation Plan describing each activity for which it seeks funding under the Direct Component." (31 CFR § 34.303) Treasury's regulations go on to outline the required elements of a Multiyear Implementation Plan and describe the public review and comment requirement. The regulations state, "The plan was made available for public review and comment for a minimum of 45 days in a manner calculated to obtain broad-based participation from individuals, businesses, Indian tribes, and non-profit organizations; and Each activity in the plan was approved after consideration of meaningful input from the public." (31 CFR 34.303(b)(8)-(9)) Treasury also acknowledges in section II of the preamble to 31 CFR Part 34 that the rule "does not require a state to ensure full participation in the public comment process. The rule is clear that a state must make its Multiyear Implementation Plan available for public review and comment 'in a manner calculated to obtain broadbased participation from individuals, businesses, Indian tribes, and non-profit organizations. . . . " In this specific instance, the fact that the commenter, a self-identified minority member of the community, was able to comment on the MIP proves that MDEQ's public outreach process is meeting its intended purpose of reaching a broad group of individuals in order to obtain "broad-based participation from individuals, businesses, and nonprofit organizations." (33 USC 1321(t)(1)(E)(ii)(III)). The commenter also stated that "Operation HomeCare, Inc. has been actively engaged in MDEQ's Restoration process pursuant to the RESTORE Act since 2014," but MDEQ could find no evidence that Operation HomeCare, Inc. or the commenter submitted a project proposal to MDEQ per the public call for projects in 2024. In fact, MDEQ could find no project proposals from the commenter or Operation HomeCare, Inc. dating back to 2014.

As the entity identified in the RESTORE Act to carry out the duties of a Gulf Coast State, MDEQ utilizes various methods of public input designed to obtain broad-based participation from individuals, businesses, Indian tribes, and non-profit organizations. In March 2024, MDEQ issued a public "call for projects" soliciting project ideas from the public for funding consideration on this amended MIP. Governor Reeves utilized the Gulf Coast Advisory Committee to review projects and develop a recommendation for funding. The Gulf Coast Advisory Committee is made up of a diverse group of local community and business leaders, elected officials, non-profit organizations, educational institutions, and state agencies, which was created by the Governor with the specific purpose of following RESTORE Act requirements for public input under 33 USC 1321(t)(1)(I). The Advisory Committee meetings were also publicly accessible via Facebook Live and archived on Facebook for later viewing. In November 2024, Governor Reeves held a press event to announce projects for this amended MIP. In November 2024, MDEQ virtually held the 9th annual Restoration Summit which is open to the public and is free of charge. MDEQ was available to discuss the proposed MIP projects. The public was able to provide input at the Summit on everything that was presented, including the proposed projects. When making the amended MIP available for public review and comment as prescribed by Treasury's regulations, MDEQ advertises the review and comment period in the two newspapers, via email blast and on MDEQ's website. The MIP Amendment is available in

English, Spanish, and Vietnamese, upon request, is available for immediate download via MDEQ's website, and is available via fax or hardcopy when requested. The commenter is included in MDEQ's email service list for receiving email blasts directly. No revisions have been made to MIP Amendment #8 in response to this comment.

### MDEQ received a comment stating that "MDEQ process fails to comply with the intended purpose and fails to provide qualitative and quantitative benefits of proposed use of funds".

MDEQ's MIP planning process is described in Mississippi's Initial MIP and subsequent MIP amendments, each of which has been deemed "complete" and confirmed to "conform to the RESTORE Act and regulations" by the U.S. Department of the Treasury. Additionally, MDEQ has received multiple awards and amendments to carry out MIP planning activities that are consistent with the Project Description, Need, Purpose, Objective, Location, Milestones, Success Criteria, and Project Budget of the Initial MIP and subsequent MIP amendments. Finally, the Objective statement for each activity in the MIP Amendment does provide qualitative benefits for each activity, and since there is no statutory requirement to describe quantitative benefits for activities in the MIP narrative, these benefits are established when negotiating a grant award with the U.S. Department of the Treasury.

In section II of the preamble to 31 CFR Part 34 Treasury states, "Several commenters asked Treasury to establish substantive criteria for evaluating project proposals, such as performance goals and preferences for certain kinds of activities. Other commenters proposed that Treasury adopt procedures, such as independent expert reviews, for evaluating synergies and potential conflicts between projects proposed under different components, or to address project proposals that may be controversial. Treasury considered similar comments during its review of comments on the proposed rule. The Act does not impose uniform criteria for the selection of projects under the Direct Component, Comprehensive Plan Component, and Spill Impact Component, or require the coordination of projects across components. Each component has different eligibility criteria, different processes for selecting activities, and different entities responsible for selecting the activities to be funded. The final rule acknowledges these differences, while still requiring compliance with the Act and Federal laws and policies applying to grants. Under these policies, Federal awards will include an indication of the timing and scope of performance, and may include specific performance goals, indicators, milestones, and expected outcomes. The appropriate vehicle for addressing these project specific requirements is the Federal award agreement." No revisions have been made to MIP Amendment #8 in response to this comment.

MDEQ received a comment stating "MDEQ continue to overlook the critical need for local capacity building to identify, mitigate and improve communities directly impacted; specifically historically underserved residents, communities and the public utilizing RESTORE Act funds".

MDEQ disagrees with this accusation. The State of Mississippi has invested more than \$37.5 million in Deepwater Horizon oil spill funding across 13 projects specifically designed to create local capacity across all coastal communities, including those directly impacted and historically underserved residents. To date these projects have seen more than 2,300 participants taking advantage of a variety of training and education programs, many of which are offered free of charge. In addition, the State of Mississippi has invested an additional \$185 million in economic projects designed to restore our coastal economy by bringing new jobs and creating opportunity for further economic growth. No revisions have been made to MIP Amendment #8 in response to this comment.
