Project: Hidden Harbor Park (HHP) - Fisheries Habitat Enhancement with Upland Restoration and Recreation Trails

Description: Manatee County's 229-acre HHP parcel represents one of a handful of large, undeveloped parcels along the tidal Manatee River. It is positioned within a rapidly developing part of Manatee County presenting a unique opportunity to restore natural ecosystems and enhance passive recreation for the public. By transforming 20 acres of disturbed land at the HHP site into a thriving ecosystem, the project will tie together an nature-based experience that not only engages visitors but supports juvenile fisheries habitat, foraging for state-listed wildlife (e.g., the gopher tortoise), refuge for federally listed wildlife (e.g., eastern black rail, wood stork, piping plover, smalltooth sawfish, and West Indian manatee), and a tidal migration corridor able to adapt to rising sea levels.

The project will include engineering design and permitting followed by construction. The design expands existing hydrologic connections with the Manatee River by transforming eroding agricultural drains and gullies into a backwater tidal creek, which will flow through estuarine habitats to an interior fish and wildlife refuge. The marsh boundaries will be buffered by coastal uplands planted to encourage wildlife nesting and strategically placed recreation trails that will dually function as fire breaks. Trails will lead to an observation mound showcasing coastal vegetation (e.g., forage grasses, pollinator plants, nesting substrates) designed to enhance habitat for the state threatened gopher tortoise.

Need: The existing site conditions consists of ruderal, unmanaged fallow farmland dominated by nuisance and invasive vegetation.

Utilizing Manatee County's Multi-Year Planning - Direct Component Funds - \$2,130,276.16 (as of Oct. 2024) for this project would enable Manatee County to create estuarine and fisheries enhancing habitat features surrounded by restored flatwoods with passive recreation trails, pedestrian bridges, and a viewing overlook all of which are expected to encourage visitor engagement.

Purpose and objective(s) (i.e., How will the proposed activity address the need? What are the desired outcomes?)

The project is proposed for ecological habitat improvements because of its landscape position along the tidal Manatee River, as well as its proximity to completed habitat restoration and a future County wetland mitigation bank. This goal of the HHP project will be to create a marine ecosystem to support productive fisheries buffered by coastal uplands by transforming 20 acres that enhance ecosystem diversity, provide a coastal migration corridor, and strengthen ecosystem resilience onsite and downstream along the Manatee River and into Tampa Bay, Sarasota Bay, and the Terra Ceia Aquatic Preserve.

Public lands are important for supporting community resilience due to their role in enhancing well-being and influencing *sense* of place. With HHP, the purpose is to create a dynamic ecosystem experience that ties together both restored habitats and passive recreation. This project will enable visitor to engage with nature, while helping to revitalize disturbed land and create valuable habitats for wildlife, including juvenile fisheries. The desired outcomes follow:

• **Transform 20 Acres**: By turning disturbed land into a thriving native ecosystem, the project will support productive fisheries habitats and boost biodiversity.

- **Enhance Public Access**: The project will include passive recreation trails, fishing platforms, and wildlife observation areas designed to enrich the visitor experience and promote passive outdoor recreation.
- **Restore Nature**: The goal is to reconnect this land to the Manatee River's tidal systems, creating marshes and mangrove habitats that help protect and enhance local wildlife, all while allowing the public to enjoy the beauty of these natural spaces.

Anticipated milestones:

- Phase 1: Design and Permitting
- Phase 2: Construction

Milestones for each activity

The project will include engineering design and permitting (Phase 1) followed by on-the-ground implementation (Phase 2).

- Phase 1: Design and Permitting
 - 1. Certified Engineering Plans
 - 2. State and Federal Permits

Project methodology for Hidden Harbor Park will include contracting with a qualified science and engineering firm. The project will be managed by Manatee County Natural Resources. Manatee County will obtain permits for the proposed project, including from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (Section 404), and the Statewide Environmental Resource Permit. Coordination with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will ensure that the federal-listed are protected. A final component of the project will be to develop the 100% construction engineering plans required to issue permits, and ultimately build the project, including an Opinion of Probable Cost to competitively bid construction.

The project is expected to receive state and federal permits within 12 to 18 months of notice to proceed followed by contractor bidding over three months and concluding with construction, which is expected to last nine months. The project duration from start to finish is anticipated to be three years (dependent on the summer rain and hurricane season).

The draft multiyear implementation plan was developed with input from County staff and partners who have extensive knowledge of the project site and years of experience in ecological restoration projects. This collaborative process ensured that the plan was grounded in expertise and a deep understanding of local ecosystems.

The draft plan was published on February 20, 2025, and made available on Manatee County's Public Notice's website for 52 days (withdrawn from website on April 14, 2025). The public notice included all required documents including, the Treasury Direct Component Multiyear Plan Matrix and Direct Component Multiyear Plan Narrative forms, and a location map. To further enhance public engagement and help the community understand the project, a summary document with a conceptual design was also included in the public notice. Public comments were encouraged and directed to a dedicated email address, which was provided in the document.

In addition, the project was shared on Manatee County's Facebook and Instagram pages, including links to the Public Notices page where all required documents were posted, along with the project email address. This extensive outreach effort ensured the public had ample opportunity to review the plan and provide meaningful feedback. The social media post was viewed over 49,000 times and reached 31,000 different accounts. People chose to click the link to the documents posted on the public notices page nearly 200 times.

The project received one comment via the public comment email, expressing support for the initiative. No changes were suggested, and as a result, the plan remained unchanged.
