SYNOPSIS

This investigation originated upon receipt of a referral from the Department of the Treasury's (Treasury) Chief of Staff, Chris Smith (Exhibits 1, 2), on January 12, 2004. The referral was predicated by Treasury's disclosure of records to former Secretary Paul H. O'Neill. On January 11, 2004, former Treasury Secretary O'Neill was interviewed on the news program 60 Minutes. During the interview, an image of a Treasury Department memorandum written to the former Secretary was displayed on television. This memorandum contained the word "Secret" – an apparent reference to classified documents contained in the attachments of the memorandum (per O'Neill, at no time were any attachments or other documents shown during the interview).

The investigation revealed that the Office of International Affairs (OIA) authored the memorandum that was disclosed during O'Neill's interview on 60 Minutes, and that the memorandum was not marked classified by OIA even though it contained classified information.

The investigation determined that on or about March 26, 2003, O'Neill made a verbal request to Treasury's General Counsel for official records during his tenure as Secretary. In or about April 2003, O'Neill received the records from Treasury, which had been produced on a single CD and two DVDs. The investigation revealed that the General Counsel and the Executive Secretary did not review the CD and DVDs prior to their release to O'Neill.

Office of Inspector General - Investigations Department of the Treasury The Principal Deputy Chief for Public Integrity, Department of Justice (Exhibit 3), was consulted regarding this investigation and determined that no criminal statutes were violated.

Additionally, the investigation revealed that among the materials Treasury released to O'Neill, were 140 documents not marked classified even though these documents contained National Security or Sensitive But Unclassified (SBU) information. Had these 140 documents been properly marked as classified, the documents would not have been entered into Treasury's unclassified computer system and O'Neill would not have received them.

DETAILS

1. Allegation: Disclosure of Classified Information

A. O'Neill's request for records.

Former Secretary O'Neill (Exhibit 4) stated that, in late February or early March (2003), he called David Aufhauser, then General Counsel, and requested records/documents that were available to him during his tenure as Secretary.

Aufhauser (Exhibit 5) recalled that O'Neill might have called him directly to request the records, but Aufhauser could not be certain as to who made the request or how the request was made. Aufhauser stated either Tim Adams (Exhibit 6), then Chief-of-Staff, or Jeff Kupfer, Deputy Chief of Staff and Executive Secretary, contacted him to determine if O'Neill was permitted to have these records.

During a review of selected Treasury employees' email accounts (Exhibit 7), a message was located from Ken Schmalzbach to George Wolfe with a carbon copy to David Aufhauser, dated December 20, 2002 (Exhibit 8). Schmalzbach advised Wolfe of various issues that should be considered regarding records removal for former Secretary O'Neill. Attached to this email message was a draft memorandum (Exhibit 9) from Schmalzbach to Aufhauser regarding "Records To Be Removed By Secretary O'Neill". The memorandum cited the National Archives and Records Administration's guidelines (Exhibit 10) for agencies to follow when a departing employee requests extra copies of records. The email further stated, "In the past, the Executive Secretary, in conjunction with the General Counsel, have acted as the approving officials with respect to determining what records may be provided to a departing Secretary."

Agent Note: Reference is made to a statement made by Aufhauser (Exhibit 5) admitting that he did not review the contents of the discs.

B. Treasury's fulfillment of O'Neill's request.

Jeff Kupfer (Exhibits 11, 32, 33) stated that since the previous two Treasury Secretaries requested records of their tenure in office, he believed O'Neill would initiate the same request. Upon O'Neill's resignation (December 6, 2002), Kupfer tasked the formation (December 6, 2002), Kupfer tasked (December 6, 2002), the Executive Secretary, to work with the Information Technology (IT) department to gather O'Neill's documents. It was decided that, if possible, O'Neill's records would be copied to a CD/DVD.

Agent Note: Corroborating the assumption that O'Neill would request copies of records, was an email from the control (Exhibit 12), to the control of the con

(Exhibits 13, 34, 35) stated that upon O'Neill's resignation, Kupfer tasked him to determine the best way to provide O'Neill with the records. The stated that these records would have been recorded and scanned into the Treasury Assignment and Correspondence Tracking (TACT) system. The discussed with the state of the state of the records for (Treasury contractor), the most efficient way to research, obtain, and produce the records for O'Neill. The requested that two sets be produced: one set for O'Neill and one set for Executive Secretary's files/records.

Agent Note: Upon final production, a "set" consisted of a single CD and two DVDs. A total of four sets were produced: one set for O'Neill; one set retained by the Executive Secretary's office; one set retained by the Executive supervisor – for the set retained and one set retained in IT's official file.

(Exhibit 14), **Sector** VIP Correspondence, stated her office was responsible for entering and scanning into the TACT system all unclassified correspondence (internal and external) to or from the Secretary and Deputy Secretary. **Secretary** advised that a correspondence number was automatically assigned by the TACT system; however, her department manually entered the author, addressee, date, and subject into the appropriate fields. **Secretary** stated classified documents were indexed and assigned a correspondence number; however, were not scanned into the TACT system since Treasury had a separate computer system to handle classified documents.

(Exhibit 15) stated that in December 2002, he was contacted by who requested the unclassified records for former Secretary O'Neill.

O'Neill"; 2) document(s) entered into the TACT system by the Executive Secretary's office; and 3) no documents to or from the White House.

stated that after several test runs were done to insure all appropriate documents were included, the final production occurred on January 24, 2003. Stated that the final release of O'Neill's records was produced on a single CD and two DVDs. The single CD consisted of speeches, statements, and testimony that were listed on Treasury's website. The two DVDs consisted of all unclassified correspondence to or from the Secretary for 2001 and 2002. stated that four (4) sets of the final product were made: two sets he hand-carried to the Executive Secretary's office delivering them to either the final product were made: two sets ultimately went to O'Neill);

while the other two sets were retained by IT (see prior Agent Note).

David Aufhauser (Exhibit 5) stated he did not review the contents of the discs, and unless Ken Schmalzbach reviewed the discs prior to Aufhauser receiving them, no review occurred prior to releasing the discs to O'Neill. Aufhauser stated he assumed full responsibility for the lack of review.

Ken Schmalzbach (Exhibit 17), Assistant General Counsel, stated there was no defined process that vetted the release of the documents. Schmalzbach stated he did not review the CD/DVDs that O'Neill received, and was unaware of anyone in the General Counsel's office that reviewed the CD/DVDs.

Agent Note: Reference is made to the previously mentioned draft memorandum of Schmalzbach, dated December 20, 2002. Schmalzbach stated that a final version of the memorandum was never issued, thus the General Counsel's office had no defined process for reviewing the records to be removed.

During a review of selected Treasury employees' email accounts (Exhibit 7), a message was located from Ken Schmalzbach to George Wolfe, dated January 11, 2004. Schmalzbach notified Wolfe that he did not review the records prior to them being released to O'Neill.

C. O'Neill's receipt of the requested records

During the review of selected Treasury employees' emails (Exhibit 7), it was noted that David Aufhauser requested the CDs (containing the O'Neill records) from Jeff Kupfer on April 1, 2003. In this same email, Aufhauser stated that he would do a "sampling" of the CDs.

Agent Note: Reference is made to a previously cited statement made by Aufhauser (Exhibit 5) admitting that he did not review the contents of the discs.

In a response to this same email thread, **see and** notified Kupfer that he provided the CDs (containing the requested records) to David Aufhauser (via **Second Second**).

Agent Note: Personal s attorney (constrained), she had no records or recollection of sending the CDs to O'Neill. The send hought she might have provided the discs to (O'Neill'

Counsel's office), advised that she never received the CD/DVDs for O'Neill, and did not mail him anything. Advised that she never received the CD/DVDs for O'Neill, and did not mail advised that no records were kept of outgoing packages from the General Counsel's office.

Bill Fox (Exhibit 19), former Assistant Deputy Counsel, stated he was at a meeting with David Aufhauser (date unknown) and noticed a CD in Aufhauser's possession. Fox inquired as to the contents and Aufhauser responded by saying it contained the O'Neill documents. Fox further recalled Aufhauser stating that he had to get the CD to O'Neill.

Aufhauser (Exhibit 5) stated someone (uncertain as to who) from the Executive Secretary's office provided one set of discs (one CD and two DVDs) to him to give to O'Neill. Aufhauser stated he then shipped one set to O'Neill via Federal Express (FedEx) or regular mail. Aufhauser confirmed that only one set was sent to O'Neill.

Agent Note: Reference is made to the previously mentioned email thread in which stated that he provided the CD and DVDs to (Aufhauser)

O'Neill (Exhibit 4) stated that about three weeks after verbally requesting the records (late February or early March, 2003), Aufhauser notified him (O'Neill) that the records were available and would be sent to him. O'Neill stated he did not recall what shipping method (i.e. FedEx, postal service, UPS, etc.) was used to deliver the package to him or who actually sent the package.

Operations records/logs all incoming packages, but that it was incumbent upon each individual or departmental office to maintain records of outgoing packages.

Agent Note: During the investigation, no logs or records were found in the General Counsel's or Executive Secretary's offices.

Responding to an administrative subpoena for records (Exhibit 21), FedEx indicated that two packages were shipped from Treasury to Paul H. O'Neill during December 1, 2002 through April 21, 2003: 1) Airbill #792179768940 from the ship date of January 30, 2003; and 2) Airbill #816184073745 from the ship date of April 10, 2003.

stated she did not see or send the CD/DVDs containing the O'Neill records to him (O'Neill).

Agent Note: Due to Treasury's lack of records, lack of information found on FedEx's airbills, and lack of information obtained during interviews, it could not be established who sent or if the CD/DVDs containing the O'Neill records were included in one of these two shipments or if they were delivered via another method.

D. O'Neill's release of records to author Ron Suskind and the subsequent publishing of <u>The Price of Loyalty: George W. Bush, the White House, and the</u> Education of <u>Paul O'Neill</u>

Upon receipt of the package containing the CD/DVDs, O'Neill (Exhibit 4) stated he called author Ron Suskind and subsequently provided the entire package to Suskind. O'Neill stated he never opened the package or reviewed its contents.

O'Neill stated that in early January (2003), he was the guest speaker at a dinner where Suskind was attending. O'Neill stated that after his speech, Suskind approached him about writing a book. O'Neill stated this was the first time he met Suskind. O'Neill further stated that over the course of the next several weeks, O'Neill and Suskind had numerous discussions about writing a book, and finally, O'Neill agreed to assist Suskind in this endeavor. O'Neill stated it was shortly after he agreed to assist Suskind that he (O'Neill) made the request of Aufhauser to obtain the records.

Continuing, O'Neill stated that after he agreed to assist Suskind, they spent a tremendous amount of time together. O'Neill stated that while traveling between Pittsburgh (O'Neill's primary residence) and Washington D.C. (O'Neill's apartment in D.C.), Suskind would usually sit in the back seat of O'Neill's car and they would discuss material for the book. O'Neill stated he provided no documents to Suskind except those documents contained on the discs from Treasury.

O'Neill advised he did not know if Aufhauser or anyone else conducted a "review" of the discs prior to their release, but was convinced that the discs contained only unclassified material since he knew classified information would not and should not be released to him. O'Neill stated that based on this premise, he had no reservations about releasing the discs to Suskind.

O'Neill further advised that upon his resignation from Treasury, he had not removed any documents (classified or unclassified) or received any additional documents (except those on the discs) pertaining to his time as Secretary.

(Exhibit 25), declined the Office of Inspector General's (OIG) request for an interview.

E. O'Neill's interview on 60 Minutes and possible disclosure of a classified document on national television

(Exhibit 15), Computer Specialist – Applications, advised that the memorandum shown on 60 Minutes was located on the TACT system under profile #2001-SE-00132. An Office of Inspector General's (OIG) review (Exhibit 26) of a duplicate copy of the CD/DVDs provided to former Secretary O'Neill, confirmed the profile number and the document's existence on the DVD for the year 2001.

(Exhibit 14) advised that all unclassified correspondence, both internal and external, was scanned into the TACT system. **Second States** stated that the procedures followed at that time (2001) dictated that classified documents were indexed and assigned a correspondence number; however, were not scanned into the TACT system since Treasury had a separate computer system to handle classified documents.

Former Secretary O'Neill (Exhibit 4) stated that no classified information or material was disclosed during the *60 Minutes* interview. O'Neill stated he believed that the memorandum displayed on television was unclassified.

The Principal Deputy Chief for Public Integrity, Department of Justice (Exhibit 3), was consulted regarding this investigation and determined that no criminal statutes were violated.

F. Other Significant Information

Treasury's Records and Information Management Program is detailed in Treasury Directive 80-05 (Exhibit 28), dated June 26, 2002. Treasury Directive 80-05e(3) required departing officials to obtain appropriate written authorization prior to removing documentary materials. Further, Treasury Directive 80-05e(4) required that nonrecord material being removed by a departing official be examined by a bureau-reviewing official prior to its release.

Additionally, Treasury Directive 80-05e(5) required O'Neill to sign Treasury Department Form (TD F) 80-05.6 ("Removal of Documentary Materials by Presidential Appointees with Senate Confirmation") (Exhibit 29); however, he signed TD F 80-05.5 (Documentary Materials Removal/Nonremoval Certification") (Exhibit 30) on December 20, 2002. Reviewing Official, reviewed the signed TD F 80-05.5 on January 6, 2003.

Treasury's Office of General Counsel, in consultation with other senior officials (Review Panel), conducted a review of the material (CD and DVDS) released to O'Neill. The Review Panel, lead by Tom McGivern (Exhibit 31), Assistant General Counsel for Legislation, Litigation, and Financial Enforcement, initially identified three documents included on the CD/DVDs released to O'Neill that contained classified information, which were not marked classified. These documents were not properly classified by their author (or author's supervisor) causing them to be entered into the TACT system, and ultimately released to O'Neill. Upon a more comprehensive review of the CD/DVDs released to O'Neill, the Review Panel discovered approximately 140 documents containing classified information, which were ultimately released to O'Neill (via the CD/DVDs).
